When I was first requested to make a flag and write an essay on Tonga on a whole I did not like the idea. I would have preferred to write on some country more widely known, for instance, Poland, Ireland or Holland; but now I am exceedingly glad as it has taught others besides myself a good many things we could not have learned otherwise.

In looking up Tonga I found that there were two countries of that name, one a group of beautiful Polynesian islands in the South seas, the other a little country in the northern corner of Malaya and in South Africa. Both of these countries are under British protection and being unable to find to which of these countries my flag belongs, I have ventured to write on both.

The Tonga Islands were discovered by Tasman in 1642 but were named the Friendly Islands by Captain Cook because of the pleasant sociable ways of the natives.

There are about one hundred and fifty of these islands in number but only about one-fifth of these are inhabited. Some of these are volcanic and when a serious earthquake occurs, these may rise and disappear at any time.

The majority of these islands are very fertile, but the people while willing and eager to learn and imitate are too lazy to work and seem to lack the qualities necessary to independent and enduring success.

Although they have a native king of their own, their laws are made by a legislative assembly which meets at Nukualofa the capital. Half the members are elected by the people, the other half being noblemen. Altogether their government greatly resembles that of Great Britain.

Most of the natives are Christianized, the majority of them are Methodists, while the rest are Roman Catholics. They are fine musicians, their only musical instrument being wooden drums, but their voices are wonderful and to hear them sing would be worth
