# BIG BOTTLES OF LIQUOR ARE BROKEN ON BANK OF THE RIVER

State Law Broken in Handling Snipment Contrary to State Local Option Law, Says County Officials.

No prosecution will follow the seixire of 50 gallons of whiskey by Sherif Wilson and Deputy Frost early unday morning. This was the statement Tuesday night of District Attorney Hedges who declared that there had been no crime committed.

Although the case will not be ressed, the whiskey, valued at \$119.50, was poured into the river by sheriff Wilson, acting on orders from ustice of the Peace Slevers. Henry Tucker, one of the two men on the wagon load of liquor Sunday morning, says that the shipment was his per sonal property and Monday produced a bill of sale.

County officers say that they were justified in destroying the liquor which was being brought into Oregon City, contrary to the state local option law. Under this not, all shipments of liquor from wet to dry territory must bear the name of the consignee, the name of the consignor and the name and address of the person ordering the liquor and the kind and amount of each package. The 10 demijohns found in the wagon, did not meet these equirements, although four of the big

bottles were labeled Moose lodge. The whiskey was taken to the north side of the courthouse near the river bank where Sheriff Wilson emptied the demijohns. The order to pour out the liquor was issued by Justice Sievers upon the advice of District Attorney Hedges.
