MILWAUKIE MAN IS INTERESTED IN DREDGE

Gold is being taken from the sands of the Willamette in the upper Portland harbor. Not in paying quantities is the gold being taken but just enough to show that the machine invented by H. H. McGovern, of Milwaukie, and John E. Noble, of Portland, is practical.

The machine was created as an experiment but its success was so marked while in use in the sands of the Willamette that Noble intends to take it to the heart of the Idaho gold country the latter part of the week, and put it to work there. C. W. Daly, who has mined in the gold sands of the coast, is operating it and says it is the best he has found. A committee from the state bureau of mines made a similar report.

The machine is on the scheme of the centrifugal force, whirling the gold from the sand, the light waste sand and pebbles flying out at the top and the heavier sand in which the gold is found, sinks to the bottom, where it is held. The machine makes from 250 to 400 revolutions a minute and two men on a prospect with it can work five tons of sand or gravel an hour.

The machine is designed to reduce the waste by saving the fine gold which is usually swept away with the lighter ore. The state report that this device reduces the waste from 50 per cent to 30 per cent.

MILWAUKIE VOTES ON BONDS AUGUST 21

MILWAUKIE, Ore., July 27.—It is believed here that the \$25,000 bond issue, with which to complete the distribution system of the municipal water plant, will carry at the special election which will be held August 21. The bond issue is a little larger than at first contemplated, but it was decided to call for enough so that the system could be completed, a reservoir site and reservoir provided for and the mains extended to Milwaukie Heights.

MILWAUKIE WATER ELECTION AUGUST 21

MILWAUKIE, Ore., July 22.—The city council last night authorized Auditor David P. Matthews to prepare for a special election to be held August 21 to submit to the voters of Milwaukie the proposition to issue not more than \$25,000 in water bonds with which to complete the distribution system of the municipal plant, already partly completed, for Bull Run water, and to extend the main to the Open Air Sanitarium and 37 other residences of Milwaukie Heights.

In the ordinance nothing is said about acquiring the two privately owned water plants. It is understood there will be funds available out of the \$25,000, if authorized, to purchase these plants in addition to completing the distribution system, if an agreement with the owners can be reached.

ECHOES FROM THE EXPOSITION

(Oregon City and Clackamas County Publicity.)

Grand Prize, the highest possible award, was won by the State of Oregon for the best general display of forage crops including all unthreshed grain. In a keen competition with many states, and a number of foreign countries, the Oregon winners should be satisfactory to Oregonians and the rest of the world will sit up and take notice of a state that carries off besides the Grand Prize, three medals of honor, twenty-four gold medals, sixty-nine silver medals and eighty-nine bronze medals for various products of the soil. Oregon forage crops will become as well known as the Oregon rose and the Oregon apple.

The Willamette Valley Italian prune was given a gold medal. The public however, long before the official awards were pronounced, had made their own decision that the Willamette Valley prune was incomparably superior to any prune to be tested on the grounds.

The Exposition has placed Oregon where she ought to be among the farming states, the magnificent exhibit in the Palace of Agriculture has made a tremendous impression, and in winning the grand prize has brought attention to Oregon's agricultural possibilities.

TEACHERS WILL SEE EXPERT INSTRUCT

MRS. M. L. FULKERSON WILL DEMONSTRATE WITH CLASS OF CHILDREN.

In order to demonstrate the best methods of primary teaching at the third annual teachers' training school, a special class of children who have not yet started school is being formed by County Superintendent Calavan.

Mrs. M. L. Fulkerson, of Salem, will have charge of the primary department of the institute and with this class of beginners will show the best methods of first grade teaching. Although the institute will close August 27, by that time the children in the

class will be able to read, Mr. Calavan said Friday.

Mrs. Fulkerson is considered one of the best institute teachers in the state and was engaged this year only after she had worked to the satisfaction of Mr. Calavan at the institute a year ago. She has devoted all her time in the last five years to institute work.

The program of the primary department follows:

First Week.
Monday—Discipline in primary grades; He That Hath Not; The Noon Hour in the Rural School; Parents I Have Met.

Tuesday—Reading and phonics—ear training; number-counting; story telling, grades 1 to 4; geography, grades 1 to 2.

Wednesday—Reading and phonics, tongue training; number, notation and numeration; grammar, grades 1 to 4; geography, grades 1 to 2.

Thursday—Reading and phonics, eye training; number, fundamental operations; study of common objects, grades 1 to 3; geography, grades 3 to 4.

Friday—Reading and phonics, word building; number, fundamental operations; picture study, grades 1 to 4; geography, grades 3 to 4.

Second Week.
Monday—Reading and phonics, word methods; number, fundamental operations; devices for correcting common errors in language, grades 1 to 2; pictures as an aid in teaching geography.

Tuesday—Reading and phonics, devices for word drills; number, fundamental operations; study of a poem, grades 1 to 2; the map.

Wednesday—Reading and phonics, devices for phonics drills; number, column addition, borrowing in subtraction; study of a poem, grades 3 to 4; primary history.

Thursday—Reading and phonics, presenting a new lesson in 1st reader; number, devices for teaching the forty five combinations, grade 2; capitalization and punctuation, grades 1 to 4; primary history.

Friday—Reading and phonics, presenting a new lesson in 2nd reader; number, devices for teaching multiplication tables; letter writing, grades 3 and 4; educative seat work.

Third Week.
Monday—Reading and phonics, presenting a new lesson in 3rd reader; number, clothed problems; second grade written work; educative seat work.

Tuesday—Reading and phonics, presenting a new lesson in 4th reader; number, long division, units of size, etc.; Enriching the Child's Vocabulary; teaching children to study.

Wednesday—Reading and phonics, silent reading period; number, seat work in number, 1st grade; written composition, grades 1 to 4; A Few Time Savers.

Thursday—Reading and phonics, enunciation and pronunciation; number, seat work in number, 2nd grade; spelling in primary grades; hygiene in primary grades.

Friday—Reading and phonics, use of the dictionary, 4th grade; number, seat work in number, grades 3 and 4; spelling in grades above the primary; spelling days in rural schools.
