

AUTOS RACE IN EAST MARKS NOT RECOGNIZED

DRIVER IS KILLED AND OTHERS SERIOUSLY INJURED.

DES MOINES, Aug. 7.—Unofficially, Ralph De Palma was made the winner of the 300 mile automobile road race here this afternoon with Mulford second and O'Donnell third.

DES MOINES, Aug. 7.—The second probably fatal accident of the 300 mile automobile race which dedicated the new speedway here occurred during the 328th lap this afternoon when the Deussenberg car, driven by William Chandler, went over the side of the track and turned over.

Driver Joe Cooper was killed in the road race here. Mechanician Joseph Piel was fatally injured in the accident which cost Cooper his life.

Cooper was killed when his car, the Sebring Special, blew a tire in the 28th lap. Cooper catapulted into the grandstand, dying almost instantly.

STAR ATHLETES BARRED

RULING OF A. A. U. WILL KEEP BEST MEN OFF TRACK.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 5.—Several star athletes, including Bergstrom, pole vaulter, and Bennett, half miler of the Los Angeles Athletic club and Kendrick Johnson, sprinter of the Olympic club, today found they were barred from competition in the Junior championships at the exposition tomorrow under a ruling of the A. A. U. that athletes who had taken first place in any intercollegiate conference were ineligible.

In the track and field meets at the exposition cinder track tomorrow and Saturday the events will be run off according to a set program that constitutes one of the rigid rules of the amateur athletic union. The trials, semi-finals and finals of any events in which trials are necessary have all to be contested in the one day.

This means that the sprinters will be hard worked men. In the 100 and 200 yard dashes full trials will be necessary. This means that the qualifying men have to run both distances three times before the winner is determined.

NEW MARKS ARE SET AT ATHLETIC MEET AT FRISCO.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 6.—The Junior national championship records were broken and one world record was set early in the Junior track meet on the exposition grounds this afternoon. P. Slamon of the Olympic club won the quarter mile event in 47 seconds, equalling the world's mark held by Maxey Long.

In the finals of the 100-yard dash H. Morse of the Salem Crescent club of New York was the winner in 9.45 seconds, clipping a fifth of a second off the former junior record held jointly by C. Parsons of the Olympic club and R. Young of the Irish American club of New York.

H. Kirkpatrick of the Los Angeles Athletic club fractured the record made by William Donald, former graduate manager of the University of California, in the 120-yard high hurdles. The latter's time was 15.35 seconds. Kirkpatrick went the distance in 15.15 seconds.

The A. A. U. officials announced that no attempts would be allowed in the Junior championship here. This act was taken because of a near race which was blown down the track fairly hoisting the runners off their feet. The wind also caught the projectiles in the field events and the men in the jumps and consequently no new marks will be allowed in these contests.

GIRL SETS NEW RECORD

TACOMA MISS HURLS BASEBALL 209 FEET.

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 9.—Miss Ruth McCabe, 18, a student of the Lincoln Park high school, broke the world's record for a girl throwing a league baseball at athletic park yesterday afternoon.

The girl hurled a baseball from deep center to the infield, a distance of exactly 209 feet, 5 inches. The previous world's record was held by Dorothy Smith of Vassar college, who threw a ball 204 feet, 5 inches, on May 4, 1911.

NATURE AS A DESIGNER.

If You Need a Model of Equilibrium Study the Kangaroo.

There was a certain college professor of machine design who was as original in his views as he was able in his subject. One of his pet theories was the interrelation between nature and correct design.

"Boys," he would say, "there has been only one designer who never made a mistake, and the more we study his work the better machines we will build. When you put legs under a machine think of a horse or a cow, and get them as far apart as you can. Don't get too much overlap at either end."

"And, speaking of a counterbalance, study the kangaroo. There is no prettier example of equilibrium in all positions. The further over he leans the more his tail comes into action off the ground. And again, in speaking of general design, wherever possible, try to work for elasticity as against rigidity. You find very little of the rigid in nature, and little trees often survive a gale by bending, where big ones are blown down."

All of which was undoubtedly very true, and made more of an impression on his hearers than some of the more complicated mathematical demonstrations that followed—John H. Van Deventer in Engineering Magazine.

GAINS BY THE ALLIES.

Germans Have Lost 1,227,740 Square Miles of Territory.

Statistics which have been watching the progress of the European war have completed a compilation of figures indicating the land area losses suffered by Germany since the conflict began. These figures show that the allies already have taken 1,227,740 square miles of Emperor William's continental possessions, which include former holdings in Asia, Africa and the Pacific.

An idea of the immensity of this may be gleaned from the fact that the area taken is nearly one-third as large as the United States, or as big as the combined states of Nevada, Utah, Wyoming, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, Iowa, Missouri, Arkansas, Wisconsin, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, West Virginia, Kentucky and Tennessee.

Some idea of the financial strain on the nations may be gathered from the fact that both the short campaign against the Germans in southwest Africa cost Britain \$67,000,000.
