Railroad Building at Night.
Railroad construction in Africa at night is made possible, says a scientific journal, by the use of a freight car as a lighting plant. Projecting from a tower built at one end of the car is a light arm that extends far out over the track. At the extreme end of this arm two searchlights are placed, while other lamps are located at intervals along the arm. By means of this arrangement plenty of light can be shed upon the portion of the track that the arm overhangs, while beams of the searchlights can be cast ahead where the work of preparing the roadbed is under way. The lighting plant permits of work in the cool hours while the torrid sun is below the horizon.

GOTCH READY FOR ACTION
Champion Wrestler Comes Out of His Retirement.
WANTS TO MEET STECHER.
Man Who Recently Won American Title From Cutler is Chap When Humboldt Farmer Would Like to Tackle—Gotch Bars All Foreigners.
Frank Gotch, wrestling champion of the world, will come back. There is only one condition to the Humboldt (Id.) gladiator's string that he attaches to his retirement of several years ago. The financial condition must be "proper," which is the word he uses himself in a letter to a Chicago sporting writer. This is a trifling condition, since there are but few foreigners in this country who could by any stretch of imagination be considered to have the slightest chance with the Humboldt man. Offer aimed at Stecher. The offer to come back is aimed squarely at Joe Stecher, the plowboy from Nebraska, who won the American title in Omaha from Charley Cutler recently. Stecher's victory, it is apparent, was all that smoked Gotch out of the quiet of his Iowa home. He saw the young fellow flop Cutler as easily as he would a sack of grain, and immediately he intimated that he might reconsider his retirement and return for one more whirl at the game. He was asked in a wire if he still considered wrestling Stecher or anybody else, and this is his reply in part: "If proper inducements are offered I might accept a match with some American, possibly Joe Stecher, but no foreigners. With Gotch back in the game promoters will make every effort to bring about a meeting between Gotch and Young Zbysco, the Pole, who has been defeating every wrestler he has tackled in the past two years. There are many wrestling experts who believe the Pole would come pretty near taking away the title from the Iowa farmer.

GAINS BY THE ALLIES.
Germans Have Lost 1,027,740 Square Miles of Territory.
Statisticians who have been watching the progress of the European war have completed a compilation of figures indicating the land area losses suffered by Germany since the conflict began. These figures show that the allies already have taken 1,027,740 square miles of Emperor William's colonial possessions, which include former holdings in Asia, Africa and the Pacific. An idea of the immensity of this may be gleaned from the fact that the area taken is nearly one-third as large as the United States, or as big as the combined states of Nevada, Utah, Wyoming, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, Iowa, Mississippi, Arkansas, Wisconsin, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, West Virginia, Kentucky and Tennessee. Some idea of the financial strain on the nations may be gathered from the fact that Botha's short campaign against the Germans in southwest Africa cost Britain \$67,000,000.

PRESENT ROAD PLAN DEFENDED BY EASTHAM
ATTORNEY DECLARES COUNTY GETS VALUE FOR MONEY SPENT IN MOST CASES.
OREGON CITY, Ore., Aug. 15.—(Editor of the Enterprise)—The proposal to replace our 60 road districts with four should awaken general interest. It is the beginning of an agitation that, unless met squarely at the start, will bring about larger and larger districts and ultimately, one district comprising the whole county, with one supervisor. No fear need be entertained of such an immediate result. Such changes do not come about abruptly, but step by step the little beginning becomes a big accomplished fact. The change proposed offers no solution for the difficult road problem now on us. Heavy automobiles and auto-trucks have ploughed through our macadamized thoroughfares. Main traveled ways, and especially those serving centers of population, suffer most from the new and terribly destructive traffic; they are being cut to pieces at a disheartening rate, yet the roads of outlying districts must not be neglected in a desperate effort to overcome the new enemy. But such would be the certain result of a "one supervisor" or "four supervisors" arrangement. The fewer the supervisors the greater will be the influence of centers of population over them. These centers would require, and I am afraid would secure, most of the road fund to maintain close-in stretches of road, fast going to pieces.

Under our present system, except in occasional instances, the county gets full value for road funds expended. Every section of the county contributes toward the fund and with every section having representation in its expenditure, as now, local pride and the prevailing spirit of harmony are important factors in getting, as we do, exceptionally good results under difficult conditions.

Owing to automobile and auto-truck traffic, some of our highways must fall far below standard. Our court will require a little time for observation and experiment before it will know just how to meet the situation. Meanwhile it will be fair, and most satisfactory ultimately, to keep the highways that are not subjected to the new and destructive traffic in "apple-pie" order.

Clackamas county needs her sixty earnest, practical workers for good roads. The protest against the plan of reducing the number gradually to the logical result of one county road supervisor should be outspoken and emphatic.

The agitation for a system of four supervisors lays the foundation for a compromise at forty; from that number a reduction to twenty will not arouse antagonism; it is the beginning that presages the end and it is against the beginning of a process of eliminating and merging road districts that this objection is aimed.
