GIBBONS LEADING OVER M'FARLAND IN SEVEN ROUNDS ST. PAUL BOY OUTPOINTS PACKEY WHO PUTS UP FAST FINISH AT BRIGHTON PARK. MONSTER CROWD WITNESSES TWO CLEVER RING GENERALS BATTLE Defeated Boxer Makes Biting Remark to Conqueror at Windup and New York Fans Almost See Un-Scheduled Encounter. BRIGHTON BEACH, New York, Sept. 11.—Mike Gibbons, of St. Paul, welterweight boxer, outpointed Packey McFarland, the sensational Chicago pugilist, before an enormous crowd here tonight, taking a clear lead in seven of the 10 rounds, dividing honors in one and being outpointed in the two final rounds, when the Chicago stockyards demon slugged his way into the hearts of the fans, who say him make a game battle for a knockout which would avert the loss of prestige. No decision was given, however, under the state rules forbidding decisions but newspaper experts witnessing the contest were a unit in granting the decision to the Minnesota boxer. However, no title will change hands from the bout because of the lack of an official referee's decision. Thrills were provided at the finish of the combat, when McFarland made a cutting remark to his conqueror as Gibbons advanced to shake hands with the boxer whom he had just beaten. There was a sudden putting up of hands, and for a moment the great crowd was breathless, expecting a sudden renewal of hostilities. The clash was averted, however. McFarland's showing was a disappointment to his friends. The Chicagoan seemed to be slow in starting and throughout the encounter his blows lacked the force shown by his antagonist. His old-time cleverness was much in evidence all through, but Gibbons fought Packey toe to toe at his own game and there never was a serious doubt as to the outcome. For four rounds Gibbons led by varying stages, but McFarland's followers had a flash of hope in the fifth, when Packey opened up and took the round by a small margin. Their hopes were short-lived, however, for Gibbons returned to his slash bang, although careful, method of fighting in the next round, and from then on until the ninth the St. Paul pugilist led easily. In the ninth McFarland adopted rushing tactics and gained the advantage, although a slight one. The final round was wildly exciting, with McFarland striving vainly for a knockout.
