367 ENTER HIGH SCHOOL ON FIRST DAY OF NEW YEAR

INCREASE IN ATTENDANCE OVER OPENING DAY IN 1914 IS 117 PUPILS

A deer, weighing 100 pounds when dressed, was killed at noon Monday by Ivan Rittenhouse in a hopfield between Oregon City and the Clackamas river. The animal had crossed the Southern Pacific tracks and was feeding when found.

RESERVOIR WILL BE CLEANED THIS WEEK

TOWN IS NOW SUPPLIED WITH WATER DIRECT FROM PUMPING STATION.

Work of cleaning out the Mountain View reservoir, preparatory to filling it with South Fork water, began Monday under the direction of Water Superintendent Howell. The reservoir will be empty this afternoon and thoroughly washed out. Cracks will be sealed with cement.

Water Commissioner Latourette said yesterday that in order to keep frogs from climbing into the reservoir a wall of sheet iron will be built around it. This work will be done this week.

FLAVIUS J. PAINTER DIES NEAR MOLALLA

Flavius J. Painter, who spent the greater part of his life in Clackamas county and was for many years employed in the local electric station, died at his home seven miles beyond Molalla at 5 o'clock Friday afternoon. Death was due to Bright's disease.

CLAUS KROHN DIES ON FARM AT HIGHLAND

Claus Krohn, for 25 years a resident of Clackamas county, died at the home of Dan Fellows at Highland 8 o'clock Sunday night. Although he has been ill for some time, his death came unexpectedly. He was born 62 years ago in Germany and came to this country when a young man. He spent many years on a Clackamas county farm and moved to Oregon City about 10 years ago. He is survived by three daughters and two sons, besides Mrs. Wiebke Krohn, his divorced wife, all of Portland. They were notified of his death Monday. The funeral will probably be held Wednesday morning under the auspices of the Redmen lodge.

MRS. F. WILLIAMSON DIES AT HER HOME

Mrs. F. Williamson of this city died at her home on 106 Washington street Monday morning at 11:30 o'clock. She was born in Scotland and came to this country many years ago. She lived in Washington and later came to Oregon, locating in Oregon City, where she has lived over 29 years.

BOUNDARY BOARD FINDS ISSUE LOST

All doubt as to the defeat of the union high school district at Gladstone and Parkplace was removed Friday when the district boundary board canvassed the vote and declared the issue lost. The state law provides that it shall require a majority vote in a majority of the school districts to carry a union high school district issue. Gladstone voted for the union high school and Parkplace against it. The total vote of the two districts was decidedly in favor of forming a union district.
