OREGON STILL AT FRONT AT THE EXPOSITION

OREGON BUILDING, Panama-Pacific International Exposition, Nov. 10.—"The most interesting thing about the sheep show," said Commissioner C. L. Hawley, of McCoy, "is the exhibit of New Zealand's 'Corriedale' sheep, a new breed remarkable for size and magnificent as a shearer. This new breed is a cross between Lincoln and Merinos," continued Mr. Hawley, "and is an extraordinary product of an extraordinary climate and environment. The New Zealanders have been working on this breed for some time and now have it definitely established. The animals shown here are beautiful and a revelation to sheepmen generally."

Another Wonderful Display. The real display of Oregon apples at this time is that in the Palace of Horticulture, this being comprised of the 100 boxes sent for competitive purpose. These apples come wholly from Hood River and Rogue River valleys and are the finest those famed sections can produce. More than thirty varieties are represented, and the display, just now being finished for judgment by the jury of awards is beautiful beyond compare.
