Chicago.—For fifteen years Charles Manning Child, associate professor of anatomy in the University of Chicago, has been experimenting on plants and animals to solve the problem of youth and age. As the result, in his "Senescence and Rejuvenescence," Professor Child turns upside down a lot of current notions about growth and death.

He prescribes regular fasts, provided no organic disease exists. He suggests vacations or changes in mental occupation after long continued mental labor in a particular field. The effect of change is the rejuvenation of the nerve cells, he finds, and this means the nerve cells are built up anew as in youth.

Professor Child utters a warning against overeating. Overnutrition, he says, increases the rate of senescence. All life, he holds out, is a development toward senescence and death. Nature's idea is to build up a man, have him do his duty toward increasing the species and then move on to deterioration.

Governor Winfield Scott Hammond of Minnesota, who died suddenly in a hotel at Clinton, La., from a stroke of apoplexy, which physicians stated had been induced by an attack of ptomaine poisoning, was fifty-four years old. He was born at Southboro, Mass., and received a bachelor's degree from Dartmouth college in 1884. He became a schoolteacher and in 1885 was made superintendent of schools at Madelia, Minn. He studied law, and six years after he was made superintendent of schools he was admitted to the bar. He defeated J. T. McClaury, the Republican tariff advocate, for congress in 1907. For three terms he represented the Second congressional district of Minnesota. Governor Hammond was the second Minnesota chief executive to die in office. Governor John A. Johnson, the last previous Democratic incumbent, died following an operation in September, 1909.
