SLIDES ON RAILROADS STOP STOCK SHIPMENTS

RULING BY JUDGE BAGLEY REVERSED BY HIGHER COURT

RECEIPTS LIGHT AND DEMAND FAR FROM HEAVY AT PORTLAND STOCK YARDS.

UNION STOCK YARDS, Portland, Feb. 15.—There was not a great deal doing in the livestock market at the Portland Union Stock Yards today. Receipts were very light, and the demand far from heavy, but at that the top on hogs was raised to \$5.95, an advance of 5 cents. The slides on the different railroads are playing havoc with shipments to the yards. Numerous trains are delayed to such an extent the livestock is unloaded and cared for until such time as it is certain the trains will get through.

Officials of the yards express the opinion they will be flooded next week. They look for record receipts and for high prices. The packing houses could use vastly more stuff than is offered on the market now, although they are in no immediate need. It is generally believed, however, if receipts are as heavy next week as anticipated, the packers of this city and those from the Sound will stock up to the limit of their capacity.

Numerous Changes.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 15.—Changes in the wholesale produce market, some of which are effective at once and others will not be until next Monday, are rather numerous. Most of them are declines with only a few advances.

Onions have advanced at country shipping points to \$2.25, which means the wholesale price will be \$2.75, an advance in both the buying and selling price of 25 cents.

Potatoes are lower. The \$2 quotation has been dropped and today the range is from \$1.65 to \$1.85.

New hothouse rhubarb has made its initial bow in the market.

Turnips are higher by 25 cents a sack, while rutabagas are that much lower.

Cabbage is 25 to 50 cents lower than last week. Heretofore the top has been \$2 cwt., but now the price has dropped to \$1.50 and \$1.75.

Apples are a little higher as stocks become less. The range is all the way from \$1 to \$2.25 a box, according to kind and quality.

Wholesalers announce that there is plenty of all kinds of fruits and vegetables, in season, on hand. There is no danger of a shortage in any line. With the turn in the weather, business is improving to a marked degree.

The steamer has arrived from California, bringing several cars of oranges, a supply of cabbage, carrots, celery root, parsley, artichokes and the like.

TRADING IS SLOW AT YARDS IN PORTLAND

OFFERINGS NOT SO HIGH QUALITY—TEN CARS OF CATTLE ARRIVE.

UNION STOCK YARDS, Portland, Ore., Feb. 15.—Market for mutton is showing much strength at North Portland with a continuance of the furnished trade. Ewes are in best demand, and it would not be surprising if some extra good in this line was offered and sold at 10c or 15c above the present basis.

On the other hand, the big local meat company is quite well supplied with lambs taken in on country purchases and it is said to be in a good position so far as wethers are concerned. On the other hand, the situation in general throughout the market and lamb trade is extraordinarily good.

Market for hogs is strong with \$8 being freely offered for best quality Willamette valley stuff. On the other hand, there has been only a scant stock of superior quality interior swine in recently and that part of the market has not been thoroughly tested.

Cattle market is steady in all branches. Ordinary quality is bringing more in proportion to its actual worth at North Portland than is the better class stuff. In fact, the ordinary quality has been carrying a premium of late.

Brief Notes of the Trade.

Chicken market is steady. Butter and cheese markets firm. Family size packages grapefruit down 25c a box. Sprouts are firmer and higher at 9c per lb. Oregon cabbage supplies almost exhausted. Canned milk market firmer.

CANBY CLASS VISITS.

Miss Adeline Wyeth, principal of the Canby school, and a class of eight students in the teacher-training course of the school visited Oregon City high school and the two grammar schools Wednesday. They had lunch at the high school cafeteria. Both Miss Wyeth and the students were pleased with their reception here, and declared their visit was a profitable one.
