conference to be held here March 9, there will doubtless be as many bills submitted for consideration as there have been plans suggested for securing the desired results. According to Percy A. Cupper, assistant state engineer, it will be well if much of the proposed legislation may be climinated prior to the conference by submitting it for public criticism.

"I have advocated the lanuance of i per cent state bonds, the proceeds of which to be loaned direct to the farmer at the same rate of interest and in the same manner as the irreducible school fund is now imaned." said Mr. Cupper.

"The simplicity of the plan and the fact that its success has been demonstrated through the loaning of the school fund and the further fact that it does not involve any radical change which should tend to upset our finanial system are commendable features,

"The simplicity of the plan is emphanized by the simple statute that would be required to put it in operation. I have prepared the following which, through crude, is believed to ontain all essential requirements:

"Section 1. The state land board of the state of Oregon is hereby anthorized and empowered to issue and sell state bonds in any amount it may deem advisable not in excess of ... per cent of the assessed valuation of all property within the state, The bonds shall be designated as farm loan bonds and shall be in form prescribed by the board in denomina ions of \$100, \$500 and \$1000. Said bonds shall bear interest at a rate not to exceed 414 per cent per annum and shall mature at twenty years from date of icatance thereof. Funds for the retirement of said bonds shall be provided by the heard by the insuance and spie of new bonds in the manner herein provided for the issu ance and sale of bonds; provided, however, that if sufficient funds are available in the "arm loan fund" hereinafter created, the board may draw upon this fund for all or any WITH CONCURRENT FISHING ACT part of the funds required to retire said bonds. 


