Mrs. J. F. Magers, who has been nursing in Portland for the past five weeks, returned home Saturday.

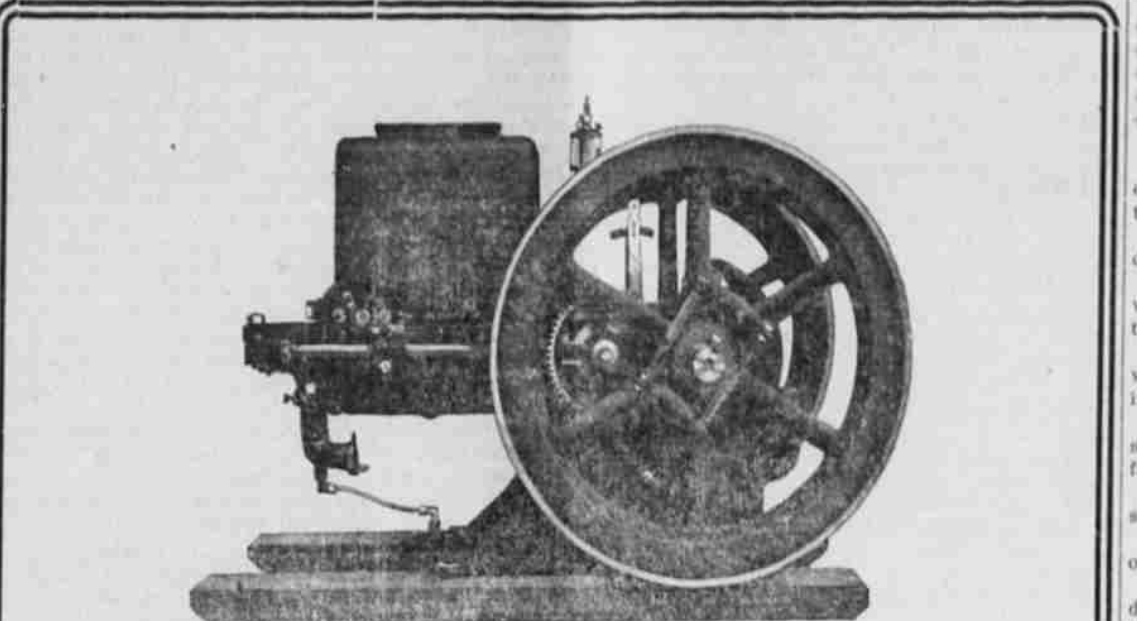
Mr. Schrieder, of Portland, spent a few days with his daughter, Mrs. Scott.
