HOGS AT \$8.40, THE YEAR'S HIGHEST PRICE

HOGS SOLD HEAVY IN STOCK YARDS

CATTLE AND SHEEP AT PORTLAND UNION STOCK YARDS ARE UNCHANGED.

UNION STOCK YARDS, Portland, Ore., March 9.—Hogs struck a new note on the season's price list at the Portland Union stock yards this morning when they soared to the highest price of the year and the top notch point of many months, advancing 10 cents to \$8.40. Gradually the market is coming into its own. The hogs which brought the new record for the season were 18 head, weighing an average of 150 pounds, splendidly finished and for the ownership of which there was a scramble. Cattle and sheep were steady and unchanged.

UNION STOCK YARDS, Portland, Ore., March 12.—Magnificent gains were made in the local livestock market at the Portland Union stock yards this morning. Pulp fed steers advanced 20 cents over last week's top quotation, grain-fed steers were 25 cents higher and hogs just naturally ballooned 40 cents to \$8, the year's new record. With such splendid gains in prices, this market is getting nearer and nearer to where it belongs and will soon be up with the leaders. The outlook is highly encouraging. When it is considered that conditions governing the market here are so vastly different from those in the middle west, the difference in prices is not so great after all.

Idaho hogs, of as fine quality as ever seen in the yards, were the direct cause of the boost in this market. Buyers were active and they did not lose an opportunity to purchase even when they meant paying higher prices than they had expected. Hundreds of head had been disposed of before 10 o'clock and by noon there was less scrambling to buy. It was a fine, healthy, wholesome market throughout and one of which the yard officials had every reason to be proud.

Receipts were 1920 cattle, 17 calves, 2278 hogs and 233 sheep, a total of 65 cars.

NINE CENTS IS PAID FOR HOGS AT MARKET

UNION STOCK YARDS, Portland, Ore., March 14.—There was no let up this morning in prices at the Portland Union Stock yards. Nine cents was again paid for quality hogs. The volume of sales was light, only 150 head being sold up to noon. There was no inquiry for anything else, buyers paying attention to hogs alone. The market held steady throughout. With prices declining in Omaha and a slow market in Chicago, the fact that this market held steady at the top-notch figure of the season is gratifying to say the least.

HOGS GO TO \$9.10 IN PORTLAND YARDS

UNION STOCK YARDS, Portland, Ore., March 15.—There are no strings attached to the livestock market at the Portland Union Stock yards. This has been demonstrated time and again, and this morning another chapter was written in yard history when, in the face of declines at both Chicago and Omaha, the hog market here advanced 10 cents, smashing all previous records for the season and lifting the price to \$9.10.

Today's advance was a healthy one, not one of those by-night affairs that certain Puget Sound market frequently experiences. The hogs offered were finely finished and just of the quality needed to lift the market. Buyers wanted them and when they found there was no chance at \$9, the previous record, they went a dime higher and secured the stuff.

The market was unchanged on cattle, but sheep are decidedly stronger. It is said buyers are willing to pay as high as \$9.50 for choice lambs, and the prediction is made that by next Monday the market will be firm at this figure.

Receipts were 17 cattle, 5 calves, 785 hogs and 18 sheep, a total of 9 cars.

DR. H. A. DEDMAN WILL RUN FOR REPRESENTATIVE

PROMINENT CANBY PHYSICIAN IS FIFTH CANDIDATE FOR THE LEGISLATURE

H. W. KOEHLER POSITIVELY DECLINES TO RUN FOR SHERIFF

George E. Swafford May Become a Factor in Race for Recorder—Bartlett, of Estacada, Files for District Attorney.

There are five candidates in the race for representative in the legislature from Clackamas county, the entry of Dr. H. A. Dedman, of Canby, into the field this week making the

fifth, the others being George C. Brownell and C. Schuebel, of Oregon City; E. D. Olds, of Oak Grove, and H. C. Stephens, of George. The candidacy of Dr. Dedman was not unexpected, as a number of the leading citizens of the southern part of Clackamas county have contended that their section was entitled to at least one of the three representatives to be chosen from Clackamas, and Dr. Dedman has the backing and support of his fellow townsmen.

H. W. Bartlett, of Estacada, has made a formal filing of his declaration to be a candidate for district attorney, and he will oppose O. W. Eastham and William M. Stone, of Oregon City, for the Republican nomination.

Otherwise the political atmosphere in Clackamas county is unchanged, the only real prospect being the possibility of George E. Swafford entering the field for the Republican nomination for recorder of conveyances. These candidates, Dudley C. Boyles, Clyde Hughes and Pearl Selye are already in the race.

The Democratic candidates up to this time are G. F. Johnson, for county assessor, and Charles W. Risley, for commissioner. It is considered probable that the minority party will bring forth candidates for representatives, sheriff and recorder, but no candidates have yet appeared for these offices. H. W. Koehler, of Oswego, who was the Democratic nominee for sheriff two years ago, and who was expected to again run for that office, has made a positive statement that he will not be a candidate, owing to the pressure of his personal business affairs, and that he will support any good Democrat who may conclude to run.
