

Digest of the Oregon Election Laws

Priday in May, of the year 1914, and biomnially thereafter, there shall be held in the several election precincts of the State of Oregon, a general primary nominating election at which shall be nominated such state, district, county and precinct officers as are to be elected at the general elec-

written application or affidavit of an elector for registration, if it be in due form and duly certified, the clerk shall fortwith register the elector in the proper precinct in the general register, and also in the separate precinct register, in the same manner as if the elector had personally appeared at

not a qualified elector of the precinct in which he registers and who is not a resident thereof, or resister in a name other than his true name; and no

elector shall register a second time in the same precinct, or register in any other precinct until his first registration has been canceled.

Notice of Death or Withdrawal.—If any person nominated as herein provided dies or withdraws before the day fixed by the law for the election, and the fact of the death becomes known to the satisfaction of the officer,

the Secretary of State or County Clerk or clerks in who's office the certificate of nomination nominating such person was filed, shall forthwith give notice by posting a certificate of the candidate who has died or withdrawn shall not be printed upon the ballots and if already printed, shall be erased or canceled before the ballots are delivered to the electors.

Army Deserters Forfelt Right of Citizenship.—All persons who deserted the Military or Naval service of the United States and did not return thereto.

1865, are deemed to have voluntarily relinquished and forfeited their rights of citizenship, as well as their rights to become citizens; and such deserters

Withdrawing Nominations—Any person who has been nominated and accepted some nomination as provided in this act, may cause his name to be withdrawn from nomination at any time prior to the election, by a writing declining the nomination, stating the reason, signed and acknowless.


