

# CITY TO MARKET BOND ISSUE AND AVOID ELECTION

### OREGON CITY BANKS EAGER TO TAKE ISSUE WHICH NOW IS OVERSUBSCRIBED.

### TOWN WILL GET 100 CENTS ON DOLLAR INSTEAD OF 98 OR LESS

Plan to Deliver City from Grip of Pool of Northwest Bond Buyers is Decided Success — City Officials Are Pleasid.

Disatisfied with the offers of professional bond dealers and provoked by their general actions, the city Saturday practically completed the sale of \$275,000 five per cent bonds through local banks, independent of bonding and trust companies.

The city will receive par for the issue by marketing the bonds directly, in this way saving at least \$500, as the best bid received from the bond buyers was 98 cents on the dollar.

To use a term made familiar by European war loans, the local bond issue was oversubscribed. The Bank of Oregon City is willing to take \$100,000 of the issue; the First National bank, \$118,000; the Bank of Commerce, \$75,000; and Frank Beck, \$10,000. The total of these four offers is \$293,000, or \$20,000 over the issue. A general reduction will be necessary in the amounts of these four offers in order to bring them within the total of the issue.

It will be necessary to receive bids for the issue in order to comply with the charter, and a special meeting of the council next week is probable to close up the sale.

**Local Bankers Aid.** The finance committee of the council, composed of James Roake, Henry M. Templeton and Roy B. Cox, aided by several local bankers engineered the sale of the issue without the usual assistance of the professional bond dealer. City Attorney Schuebel also assisted.

The procedure followed by the city at first in attempting to dispose of the issue was the usual method employed.

The city advertised for bids in the usual way, and offers were received. At one time the issue was given to a Portland trust company, but the company's attorneys found an alleged flaw in the issue. The city sought new bids, but the council was unable to secure a satisfactory offer. At a meeting of the council Friday night a second election authorizing a change in the levy was considered, but the finance committee of the council Saturday hit upon the plan of marketing the issue directly among local banks.

**Eager to Buy Bonds.** Showing the popularity of municipal bonds in financing circles and attesting to the substantial credit of Oregon City, local banks, after communicating with outside interests, were eager to secure the issue. The Bank of Oregon City and the First National bank are heavy holders of warrants, and the issue was authorized to meet the warrant debt.

This easy solution of a problem that has confronted the city for weeks in the cause of considerable satisfaction among city officials. Many who resent the tactics of the bond buyers are especially pleased as the town has shown its independence of the professional bond buyer.

The success of the town's venture in marketing its own issue of bonds free from the bond broker also saves the city from holding a special election to overcome the alleged minor flaw which one set of attorneys claimed they found in the issue. City Attorney Schuebel, who was instructed Friday night to prepare a new charter amendment authorizing the issue and providing for a special levy to make the payments, will not begin this task.

The bonds are of the serial variety and have a life of from two to 20 years. However, all bonds will have attached a full number of coupons for 20 years so that in case the city cannot at any time make prompt payment of principal when due, the interest charges will be continued regularly.

# WATERBOARD HAS PLANS AND SITE FOR RESERVOIR

### RESERVE SUPPLY OF 6,500,000 GALLONS FOR EMERGENCY IS FAVORED.

### OTHER PLANS, INCLUDING LINE TO MILWAUKIE, ARE GIVEN UP

Board Pays \$2600 for Four Acres in Mountain View District—Cost of 5,000,000-Gallon Reservoir is Estimated Over \$30,000.

The water board has completed the purchase of a four-acre reservoir site at Mountain View which lies next to the present reservoir, and has plans and specifications for a new reservoir with a capacity of 5,000,000 gallons, which, with the present reservoir, will give the town a reserve supply of water of 6,500,000 gallons.

The water board has been considering several plans by which the town would have an emergency supply, and the construction of another reservoir with a large capacity has been practically decided upon, although definite action toward the immediate construction of the reservoir is not probable.

**Other Plans Dropped.** The plan of laying a main to Milwaukie and to connect there with the Hill Run main, which was at first favored because it would provide an income from the communities along the line, has been dropped as the total cost of the project would be about \$30,000, according to the estimates of H. A. Rands.

The board has also received information that the plan of treating river water with hypochlorine does not meet with the sanction of the state board of health.

**Big Reserve Supply Sought.** With two reservoirs capable of holding 6,500,000 gallons of water the city would have a reserve supply which would last several days in case of a break in the South Fork line. The reservoir would cost completed between \$20,000 and \$30,000.

The four acres of ground bought by the board cost \$2600, and was a part of a six-acre tract owned by Conrad Czerniecki. It lies in the Holmes donation land claim. The site for the proposed reservoir is about 100 feet from the present one.

The one condition which caused the water board to hesitate in ordering the construction of the new reservoir is financial. The warrant indebtedness of the department has been reduced to \$917.55, the lowest sum it has been for many years. The board has applied to the warrant debt \$20,000 received from the sale of property to the Hawley mill, and over \$25,000, the surplus after the construction of the South Fork line. The cost of the new reservoir would be met with warrants, which would put the warrant debt back where it was a year ago.

### LOWER COURT REVERSED

In a decision Tuesday, the supreme court reversed the decision of Circuit Judge Campbell in the personal injury suit of Valeria G. Benzie against the Portland Railway Light & Power company. The opinion was written by Justice Benson.

# LIBERTY BELL BIRD CLUB IS ORGANIZED

### PROGRAM WILL BE GIVEN APRIL 12 AT MAPLE LANE SCHOOL HOUSE.

A Liberty Bell Bird club has been organized at the Maple Lane school with a charter membership of 83. This club is formed for the purpose of promoting the welfare of all song and insect eating birds.

The Liberty Bell club is the largest bird club in the United States, with a membership of over 550,000 in all its states. It was first started in January, 1913, with national headquarters in Philadelphia, where they are still located. In one year the club gained over 251,000 members.

The motto of the club is "Protect Our Feathered Friends," and the pledge is "I desire to become a member of the Liberty Bell Bird club and promise to study and protect all song and insectivorous birds and do what I can for the club."

A program will be given at the Maple Lane school house on April 12, national bird day. The Junior Audubon club will soon organize in the Maple Lane district and work in conjunction with the older members.
