WOODCUTTER DIES AS HE DRESSES IN TENT NEAR OSWEGO LAKE

CORONER IS ENDEAVORING TO FIND RELATIVE OF D. J. LOGEMAN FROM PAPERS LEFT.

D. J. Logeman, aged 57 years, died suddenly from heart failure while dressing Saturday morning in a tent near the upper end of Oswego lake.

According to Herman Logeman, fellow worker, the deadman had been complaining of pains around his heart for some time and had been taking treatment. It is evident from papers found in Logeman's effects, which are now held by Coroner Hempstead, that at one time he was prosperous.

Coroner Hempstead is endeavoring to find relatives or friends of the dead man in this country, and the body will not be buried for several days.

SALEM, Ore., April 3.—New courses whereby the work of the University of Oregon and the Oregon Agricultural college will be given enlarged scope for the next school year.

Besides Dr. C. J. Smith, Portland; A. G. Beale, Tillamook, and J. E. Hedgcock, of Oregon City, members of the board; P. L. Campbell, president of the University of Oregon, and Dr. W. J. Kerr, president of the Oregon Agricultural college, were present.

For the University of Oregon the board gave its sanction to new courses in the departments of architecture, chemistry, commerce and industry, economics and sociology, education, English literature, German rhetoric, American literature, English history, hygiene and physical education, journalism, Latin, law mathematics and astronomy, physics, philosophy, physical training, psychology and romance languages.

COUNTY COURT HOLDS UP WORSWICK'S OFFER

FORMER VICTORIA, B. C., CITY ENGINEER APPEARS BEFORE COMMISSIONERS.

The county court has taken under consideration the proposition of Harry Worswick, formerly of the Standard Paving company and ex-city engineer of Victoria, B. C., to lay hard surface pavement, five inches thick, in Clackamas county for not over 60 cents a yard.

He wants the county to buy a paving plant, which he says he is in position to secure for \$800, and asks for an additional \$500 with which to install it.

By beginning grading now, so that he could take full advantage of the summer weather in laying the pavement, and by buying materials early in the season when they are cheap, Mr. Worswick says the hard surface will not cost over 60 cents a yard and that it will be the same class of work as Main street.

NEW YORK, April 5.—Fourteen hundred employes of the New York Central railroad went on a strike on the Mott Haven yards this afternoon, demanding the reinstatement of several discharged men.

It was announced that 8000 men employed on the lines between New York and Buffalo would be called out unless the road should meet the demands of the men.
