





SALEM, Ore., April 14 .- A batallion Oregon of candidates for nomination to national, state and district offices totaling in number 423 will face Oregon's electorate May 19, when the battle for

party preference will be fought. All records are broken. This army of office seekers is composed of 328 Republicans, 85 Demo-

crats and 10 Progressives. In comparison with the number of candidates, few are taking advantage of space in the official election pamphlets.

For the Republican nomination for president of the United States the ballot this time will offer the names of Theodore E. Burton. Albert E. Cummins, Charles E. Lockwood, of Portland, and possibly Charles E. Hughes, while the Democrats have only on Oregon man, Woodrow Wilson.
