

AUDITORIUM FAR TOO SMALL FOR STUDENTS' SHOW

"THAT FRESHMAN," ONE-ACT FARCE BY FRANK KING, IS HEADLINER.

MUSIC OFFERED IN LONG AND VARIED PROGRAM OF HIGH ORDER

Orchestra Furnishes Music During Hour Given to Inspection of Recently Enlarged Building—Fifteen Acts Presented.

Before over 700 persons the students and teachers of the Oregon City high school Friday night presented a program, every number of which met with an ovation of applause.

The school auditorium was built to accommodate 500 persons, and many were forced to stand out in the hall. The crowd was probably the greatest that has assembled in the building.

The doors were opened at 7 o'clock and for an hour the school was open to inspection while the school orchestra composed of 10 members led by Gustav Flechtner, played.

The second number on the program was the presentation of the customs of the generations dating from 1775 and was given by 15 students with the setting in Dame Fashion's studio.

Vocal numbers by the Misses Aronson were good and the harmony of the young women was well applauded. The operetta, "Three Wishes," had an effective setting and showed the living room of the home of many years ago. The singing during this scene was pleasing.

Albert Roake, of the senior class, appeared on the program in the "Garden of My Heart." Miss Ruth Hawkins, freshman, gave a reading.

The freshman girls' quartet, composed of Misses Lagerson, Staats, Blackburn and Morgan, appeared in three numbers and were roundly applauded. Linden McCasland rendered a saxophone solo, "A Perfect Day."

Marvyl Ely plainly demonstrated that she was out to take all advantage possible of the leap year, when she appeared in her number, "When a Woman Proposes."

The one-act comedy written by Frank King and presented under the direction of Prof. Toose, was a credit to all concerned in its introduction. The play is based along college lines and the different parts were well taken, the line of talk of all being quick, witty and enjoyable.

The boys high school quartet hit the patriotic chord when they gave "Don't Hit the Hand that Feeds You." Messrs. Myers, Battle, Armstrong and Champion composing the quartet. Miss Alice Holman gave a vocal solo that was well received.

The last number on the program of 15 acts was a pageant of patriotic songs, in which about 25 of the students rendered songs of war days of long ago. The stage setting and the costumes of this act were splendid, the costumes being red, white and blue, while the scenes changed with each song.

The whole program was so good that it would be an injustice to give any one member especial credit. The teachers of the high school can well be congratulated on the success of the bill, as also can be the students who entered into the program with a spirit that added much to its success.

F. C. FREESE SUES FOR DIVORCE DECREE

WIFE WOULD NOT SPEAK TO HIM FOR DAYS AT A TIME, HE SAYS IN COMPLAINT.

Charging that for days at a time she would not speak to him, that she always found fault with his conduct and that she once told him to "clear out," F. C. Freese Thursday filed a suit in the circuit court for a divorce from Lucinda Freese. The family is one of the best known in the city.

Mr. and Mrs. Freese were married December 12, 1894, in Cleveland, Ohio. They have two children, Katherine, aged 17 years, and Edith, aged 15 years, the custody of whom is sought by the plaintiff. Brownell & Slevens are his attorneys. Mr. Freese is employed by one of the local mills.

JOHN F. ALBRIGHT FILES FOR SHERIFF

SECOND REPUBLICAN CANDIDATE APPEARS—OTHER OFFICE SEEKERS IN RACE.

John F. Albright, Republican, Monday filed his declaration as a candidate for sheriff and paid a filing fee of \$20, which under the new state law does away with the necessity of circulating a petition. Mr. Albright is the second candidate to enter the race for the Republican nomination for sheriff, the first being William J. Wilson, the incumbent.

Mr. Albright in his statement declares that he "will give the people what they expect from the sheriff's office," and the words which will be placed on the ballot after his name are, "Strict enforcement of the laws; business administration."

W. H. Bottemiller, of Clatsop, candidate for the Republican nomination for county commissioner, filed his petitions for that office Monday. He is the first candidate to file his petitions for an office in this county, the others not having fully prepared their petitions or having taken advantage of the law allowing the paying of a fee instead of filing a petition.

Declaring that he would "fill the office of precinct committeeman to the confusion of the Democrats," E. E. Brodie has filed for Republican precinct committeeman in precinct No. 2, Oregon City.

Two candidates for constable and two candidates for justice of the peace filed Monday. They are: W. A. Beck, of Molalla, justice of the peace; G. W. Prosser, of Oswego, justice of the peace; Edwin Bates, of Estacada, and Charles E. Austin, of Oswego, for constable.

E. T. MASS SAYS IT'S HIS DUTY TO RUN IF NAME IS WRITTEN IN

FORMER SHERIFF WILLING TO TAKE DEMOCRATIC NOMINATION, IF GIVEN HIM.

Ernest T. Mass, who has served two terms as sheriff of Clackamas county and is chairman of the Democratic county central committee, will take the Democratic nomination for sheriff if his name is written in on the ballot. This was his declaration Monday, when asked concerning the report circulated during the last few days that he would enter the race.

Mr. Mass made it clear that he does not propose to make an effort to secure the nomination. He will not file a declaration as a candidate. But if the Democratic voters of Clackamas county hand him the nomination without any effort on his part, then he will accept it.

He explained that it was his duty to accept the nomination if given him without personal effort.

H. Leighton Kelly, who was reported as a possible candidate for the Democratic nomination for sheriff, is not expected to file although he has made no statement of his intention.

J. E. Hedges, who has been discussing the advisability of holding a get-together meeting of Democrats to get more names on the Democratic primary ballot, said yesterday that he found a lack of interest in politics this year among leaders of the faith and declared that the chances of holding the meeting before the time for filing ends Wednesday night were slim. The only alternative offered the Democrats to filling out the county ticket is the writing in of names on the ballot.

The third of the series of squad debates was held Friday afternoon in the high school auditorium. The question was: "Resolved, That preparedness is necessary for the welfare of the United States." The affirmative was composed of Miss Ruth Hawkins and Miss Ernestine Hart and the negative Miss Margaret Clark and Miss Ester Staats. The negative was given the decision by O. D. Eby, Burr Tatro and Mr. Hahn as judges. The best debaters were Miss Margaret Clark and Miss Ernestine Hart and these two young women will again appear in the debating squad.

A musical and literary program was given by the sophomore and freshman literary society which follows: Vocal solo, Miss Ethel Younger; recitation, Miss Alice Biermann; violin trio, Miss Mabel Morgan, Dwydell Ladd and Emerson Hoeye.

Last Wednesday afternoon at the high school the second of a series of debates was held. The question debated was "Resolved, That the United States should permanently retain the Philippine Islands." Earl Paddock, Miss Echoel Armstrong and Herman Timmer represented the affirmative side and Bennie Staats, Misses Marvel Ely and Myrtle Young the negative.

The judges, J. R. Bowland, G. L. Hedges and J. Dean Butler, decided on the affirmative as the winners. The four best debaters were Earl Paddock, Miss Echoel Armstrong, Bennie Staats and Miss Marvel Ely.

A judge and six jurors were elected to prosecute various cases arising during the meetings. The judge chosen was Charles Wallace and the jurors are Miss Ruth Hawkins, Mason Peunder, Birdsell Ladd, Merleingham, John Beattie and Conrad Vierhaus.

FRITZ VON PAPEN AND FOUR OTHERS INDICTED IN N. Y.

FIVE GERMANS ACCUSED OF PLOT TO BLOW UP WELAND CANAL IN CANADA.

CHANCE OF TRIAL IS SLIM AS OFFENSE IS NOT EXTRADITABLE

Only Hope of Arresting Former Attaché, Described as "Brains" of Conspiracy, Is in His Return to the United States.

NEW YORK, April 17.—Captain Franz von Papen, recalled military attaché to the German embassy at Washington, was indicted today by the federal grand jury here as the organizer and financier of an alleged conspiracy to blow up the Welland canal in Canada. With him also were indicted Captain Hans Tauscher, alleged agent of the Kripps in the United States and husband of Mme. Johanna Gadek, the prima donna; Constantine Govani, Alfred J. Fritzen and another man whose names has not been revealed. It was learned from a reliable source that the last named is a prominent German whose name has been mentioned frequently in connection with German propaganda. His arrest is expected tomorrow.

Federal officials do not expect to bring Von Papen to trial. While he is no longer immune from prosecution by the United States civil authorities, since he ceased to be a member of the German embassy staff, the offense with which he is charged is not extraditable under any treaty with a foreign government.

The indictment, it is understood, was returned with the sanction of the department of justice, and is believed to establish a precedent. No effort will be made to have Von Papen brought here, but the indictment will be held in abeyance in case he should ever return to the United States.

Von Papen was designated by federal officials as the "brains" of the alleged conspiracy.

The other three men whose names were made public were, according to the indictment, merely agents and employees of Von Papen.

The five men alleged to have carried dynamite and other explosives on suitcases to Niagara Falls, where the plot was abandoned, were Horst Von Der Goltz, also known as Franz Hobart Wachendorf, known also as Bridgeman Taylor; Fritzen, Govani, Carl Tuschendorf and Joachim Buz.

John T. Ryan, an attorney and prominent in politics in Buffalo, N. Y., was named in the indictment as the man who acted as intermediary in the payment of money by Von Papen to Von Der Goltz.
