LETTERS SENT THOSE IN LEGISLATIVE RACE

ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE DOES NOT INTEND TO LESSEN EFFORTS, EVEN WITH STATE DRY.

The Oregon Anti-Saloon league is as active as ever, this time not fighting for the prohibition amendment to the state constitution, but lining up the candidates for the legislature on proposed amendment to the prohibition law. Every candidate for legislative honors has received a letter, a copy of which follows:

The dry law now forbids the sale of any beverage containing so much as one-half of one per cent of alcohol by volume. Will you vote against all attempts to increase this percentage?

The present law permits druggists to sell ethyl alcohol only, and in amounts not to exceed two quarts in 25 successive days to any person or family. Will you vote against all attempts to permit the sale of other unaccompanied intoxicants, or to increase the amount of pure ethyl alcohol permitted to be sold to any person within any 25 successive days, unless upon the written statement of a reputable licensed and regularly practicing physician that a greater amount is necessary for external use or application only?

The present law forbids the solicitation of liquor orders by mail. Owing to the common rule of law which deems a sale to be made where delivery is made to the common carrier, we are unable to reach the mail order solicitors who are violating this law.

The United States supreme court has granted relief to West Virginia, basing their decision on the following words which appear in the West Virginia law and not in ours: "In case of a sale in which a shipment or delivery is made by common carrier, the sale thereof shall be deemed to be made in the county wherein the delivery thereof is made by such carrier to the consignee." Will you put these words into the Oregon law and relieve Oregon mothers, wives, sisters and daughters from the insulting solicitation by mail for liquor orders? (This does not abridge the right to send for and receive liquor, but would stop mail solicitation.)

Will you vote for a measure forbidding the keeping or storing of intoxicating liquors in any store or other place of business or of public resort, or in any public storage home or warehouse, except the accepted shipments of liquor in the custody of common carriers may be kept in the regular storage room or warehouse of such common carriers?

Will you vote for a measure empowering justices of the peace and made by a reputable citizen or citizens, to summon witnesses before them, to place such witnesses under oath and question them regarding their knowledge of liquor sales and liquor nuisances; reduce their testimony to writing, if the evidence adduced seems to warrant prosecution; require said witnesses to sign their testimony, and to forward such testimony to the district attorney; and empowering the justice of the peace, at his discretion, to require the witnesses to give bond or recognizance for their appearance to testify before the grand jury, or to give testimony in the trial before the said justice or other grand magistrate as the district attorney may elect, but such bond or recognizance not to run beyond the close of the next session of circuit court unless it shall be renewed at the request of the district attorney? (This would enable the gathering of evidence and the preparation for prosecution in remote districts of a county before material evidence could be destroyed, witnesses disappear, or an alibi be concocted by the witnesses in collusion. This would reduce the costs of the district attorney's office to the taxpayers, and largely do away with the need for employment of detectives.)

Will you vote for a measure permitting any person or organization, in the name of the state, either through the district attorney or by private attorney, to bring action at the costs of the state for abatement of a liquor nuisance? (This is the law which finally made prohibition a real success in Kansas.)

VON PAPEN KNEW OF SCHEME FOR AN IRISH REVOLT

NEW YORK, April 26.—Papers which show that prominent Irishmen and Germans in the United States exhibited a keen interest in plans for a revolt in Ireland, were found by federal agents in their raid on the former offices here of Captain Franz von Papen, withdrawn German military attaché, according to a statement made tonight by high government officials.

Whether the government will undertake an investigation rests with the department of justice at Washington which has the question under advisement, it was said.

Some of the letters and other documents, it was asserted, bear the signatures of men who have been leaders in the home rule propaganda in this country. Methods of raising funds for the equipment of Irish revolutionists were discussed freely and in some of the letters appeals were made for financial aid.

That the activities of Sir Roger Casement were partly financed by Irish-Americans, who contributed more than \$100,000 to the cause was the assertion made here today by Jeremiah A. O'Leary, director of the United Irish societies of this city and president of the American Truth society.

Mr. O'Leary and other prominent Irish-Americans here who favor Irish independence insisted, however, that there was no connection between Sir Roger's expedition and the Dublin revolt.

Plans are being made for a mass meeting to be held under the auspices of the United Irish societies Sunday night, at which Sir Roger Casement's expedition and the Dublin revolt will be indorsed, Mr. O'Leary announced.
