Hyal Lawrence, who came to this city Monday, accompanied by his wife, with the intention of visiting with his daughter, Mrs. W. L. Durr, of Logan, died at the home of Mrs. Durr Friday morning after a few days' illness of kidney trouble.

Mr. Lawrence was born in Grass county, Ontario, Canada, April 29, 1837, and at Cathart, Ontario, Canada, in 1856 he married Miss Elizabeth Trimble, and later came west, settling at Vancouver, Wash., where he had made his home until his death.
