

FEAR OF HUGHES' RIVALSHOWN BY ATTACKS ON HIM

MANAGERS OF OTHER CANDIDATES RECOGNIZE POWER OF FRANK H. HITCHCOCK.

JOHN W. WEEKS ARRIVES TO AID IN FIGHT ON JUSTICE HUGHES

Chicago Convention Opens Week from Wednesday - Fairbanks Forces Are Noisy - Plans of Various Aspirants Are Known.

CHICAGO, May 31.—Justice Charles Evans Hughes and Frank H. Hitchcock were the targets today of all the big and little guns of the avowed candidates for the Republican nomination for president by the convention which is to begin in the Coliseum one week from today.

Hitchcock, the man who engineered for Colonel Roosevelt the nomination of Taft 1908, it could be plainly seen wherever one went along candidate row, is the man the managers fear. Still Mr. Hitchcock insists he is not to be taken in the light of a manager.

In a statement to the press, replying to the attacks on him, he said: "The concerted attack the managers and publicity agents of certain candidates are making on those of us who favor the nomination of Justice Hughes only serves to show how formidable they consider the movement in his behalf."

John W. Weeks, United States senator from Massachusetts, a candidate for the nomination, arrived today and took the leadership of his staff against Hughes.

It will be the Root plan to let the Hughes and Roosevelt battle rage as long as it will. Root, it develops, does not want a large vote on the first ballot. He wants to start small and grow as the balloting progresses.

A statement has been issued from the Root headquarters to the effect that "it is admitted Roosevelt is out with the prime object of extinguishing Hughes."

Burton managers, emulating the Roosevelt boosters, have interested Illinois in the Burton cause. Statements were given out endorsing the Ohio man as a second choice after the "favorite son" period from Merritt Starr, E. J. Murphy and James M. Kitteman.

Edward Tanner, former Progressive party leader in Indiana, came in to help boost along the Charles W. Fairbanks cause.

If noise and enthusiasm count for anything Charles Warren Fairbanks, the "tall sycamore" of Indiana, is already nominated and elected president of the United States. Hoosier boosters in large numbers are already on the ground. They have a distinct advantage over other candidates in that they can return to their own state at night and return for fresh attacks the next day with their forces largely augmented.

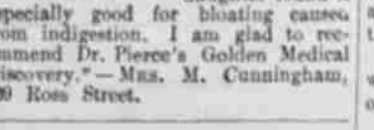

FOUR KILLED, 18 ARE INJURED IN DEFENSE PARADE

WOODEN AWNING IN DALLAS FALLS ON PEOPLE WHO WATCH MARCHERS.

PREPAREDNESS PAGEANT BRINGS SORROW TO TEXAS COMMUNITY

Rescuers Dig in Debris and Uncover Quartet of Corpses. While Rumor Has it More Dead Are Hidden in the Tangled Ruins.

DALLAS, Tex., May 30.—Four or more persons were killed and 18 injured late this afternoon when the wooden awning over the sidewalk of a building on Main street collapsed. The persons killed and injured were part of a throng watching a preparedness parade.

The bodies of four dead were taken from under the awning and it was reported another person had been killed. Immediately following the accident the parades gave way to ambulances and automobiles, in which the injured were taken to hospitals. Eighteen people were received at these institutions suffering from more or less serious injuries, and many more were slightly hurt in the panic that followed the collapse of the structure.

MEXICO DEMANDS THE WITHDRAWAL OF U. S. TROOPS

WASHINGTON IS TOLD UNITED STATES SOLDIERS ARE NOW INVADERS.

VIOLATION OF ORIGINAL PACT CHARGED IN NOTE FROM CARRANZA

Declaration of Future Intentions Toward Mexico Demanded—De Facto Government Says Troops Crossed Without Permit.

MEXICO CITY, May 31.—Contenting that the words and protests of the United States have been entirely in contradiction of their acts, and in spite of protests, not to interfere in the affairs of Mexico, soldiers of the United States are in Mexico without the consent of the Mexican government, and in violation of Mexico's sovereignty, the Mexican government asks for the immediate withdrawal of these troops.

The request is made in a 12,000-word note, made public at the foreign office today.

The note recites that the American troops crossed the border after the Columbus incident without the permission of the Mexican government. The act was not considered one of invasion then, solely because the United States said they had misinterpreted the attitude of the Mexican government.

The Mexican government therefore invites the United States to bring to an end this unportable situation. The note concludes, "and to support its protestations and declarations of friendship by an immediate withdrawal of American troops."

Maintaining that the protests of friendship by the United States and the expressed desire for non-intervention have been contradicted by the acts of the Washington government, the note says the time has arrived when Washington must declare itself clearly and unequivocally as to its future intentions toward Mexico.

'BUILDER OF THE NORTHWEST' DIES AFTER OPERATION

JAMES J. HILL, GREAT RAILROAD BUILDER, PASSES AT HOME IN ST. PAUL, MINN.

SON, LOUIS W. HILL, IS LIKELY TO SUCCEED FATHER TO CONTROL

Attempt to Ward Off Death by Operation Is Futile—Flags in His Home City at Half Mast Under Orders of Governor.

ST. PAUL, May 29.—James J. Hill, aged 78 years, railroad builder who probably more than any other one man has aided in the upbuilding of the great northwest, died here today following an illness caused by intestinal catarrh of several years' standing, but only of recent severity. The "emperor builder" and financier whose wealth is rated in the hundreds of millions—became gravely ill only several days ago and operations of Friday and Saturday failed to check the infection which has resulted and Mr. Hill gradually lost strength, losing consciousness late last night and remaining in a state of coma until life passed at 9:30 o'clock this morning.

The funeral will be held Wednesday at 2 p. m., and interment will be in a private mausoleum at Mr. Hill's summer home five miles from St. Paul. Louis W. Hill, son of the railroad builder and general manager of his properties and business interests, will probably remain as the head of the various Hill interests, becoming executor of the vast estate.

LAND GRANT BILL PASSED BY HOUSE BY A 186-6 VOTE

AMENDMENT TO CUT COUNTIES' SHARE OF FUNDS DEFEATED BY REPRESENTATIVES.

STATE'S DELEGATION BY HARD WORK AVERTS 10 PER CENT CUT

Counties Will Get 30 Per Cent, State 20 Per Cent, Reclamation Fund 40 Per Cent and Federal Treasury 10 Per Cent.

WASHINGTON, May 25.—The house of representatives, without a roll call, today passed the Oregon & California land grant bill by a final vote of 186 to 6, after having voted down the Foster amendment, which proposed to reduce the counties' share of the proceeds from 30 to 20 per cent.

The Foster amendment was defeated by a vote of 186 to 6, after a most vigorous personal campaign conducted last night and this morning by the three congressmen from Oregon. Principal provisions of the bill as passed are: Title to unsold lands shall revert in United States. Lands to be classified as power sites, timber lands and agricultural lands. Timber to be appraised and sold separate from land for cash or on time. Patent to issue for timber when sold; state authorized to tax timber when paid for. Cut-over lands subject to homestead without cost; other agricultural lands to be paid for at \$2.50 an acre. Lands in Oregon, Oregon City and Corvallis watersheds reserved from entry. Attorney general to sue railroad for accounting. Appropriation made to pay all accrued unpaid taxes. Receipts to be divided, 20 per cent to state school fund, 30 per cent to counties, 40 per cent to reclamation fund, 10 per cent to federal treasury. Preference right of entry given bona fide settlers residing on land continuously since December 1, 1913. Hundred thousand dollars appropriated to classify lands.
