COLISEUM, Chicago, June 7.—Emphasizing that it was not a time for re-entertainment, but of a reconsecration, Senator Harding, of Ohio, in the keynote speech today urged the delegates to the Republican national convention to forget the disastrous differences of four years ago and plunge into the coming campaign with a declaration of principles which would bring success at the polls.

Republican Convention Opens. CHICAGO, June 7.—The Republican national convention assembled in the Coliseum today, heard a keynote speech delivered by Senator Harding, of Ohio, perfected an organization and adjourned until 11 o'clock tomorrow. It all took two hours and in its lack of demonstration or outbursts and its strict attention to the business in hand was reminiscent of the Philadelphia convention of 1900 that nominated McKinley and Roosevelt.
