OREGON IRON & STEEL COMPANY PLANS EXTENSIVE WORK IN DUNTHORPE ADDITION

OSWEGO, June 15.—(Special)—According to present arrangements of the Oregon Iron & Steel company, plans will soon be completed that will entail the expenditure of about \$400 on an acre on the property in Dunthorpe addition.

Dunthorpe addition, which lies equally in Clackamas and Multnomah counties, is located on a plateau above Elk Rock and derives its name from the location, "A Hamlet on the Hill." It is part of the Dunthorpe land claim.

The tract consists of 500 acres, three hundred of which is improved. The Oregon Iron and Steel company, the present owners of the site, arranged through Superintendent A. S. Pattullo assisted by C. C. Colburn, landscape gardener, formerly with Olmstead Brothers and R. T. Greenleaf, for the general arrangement of the site.

They hunted several days and finally found one. He was a cripple."
