

# 2 TEUTON SHIPS, 12 MERCHANTMEN SUNK, IS REPORT

GERMAN CONVOY DISPERSED AND FLEE TOWARD COAST, SAYS SWEDISH MESSAGE.

## ALL OF KONIG VON SACHSEN'S CREW SAID TO HAVE DROWNED

Destroyer, Auxiliary Cruiser and 12 Other Craft Sunk—Germans Taken Completely by Surprise by Russian Squadron.

NYKOPING, Sweden, via London, June 14.—Thirteen German merchantmen, which were coming from the north conveyed by an auxiliary cruiser and some torpedo boats and armed trawlers, were attacked early this morning by a squadron of Russian destroyers, torpedo boats and submarines near the Swedish coast. The German convoy was dispersed and the merchantmen fled toward the coast.

It is reported that some of the vessels were sunk.

COPENHAGEN, via London, June 14.—Describing the Baltic fight, the Dagens Nyheder says that the Russian squadron won an important victory. The Russians had six destroyers and several submarines and were going at such speed that the Germans were taken completely by surprise, and fired only one shot and then made for port in the utmost haste.

"It is believed," says the paper, "that 12 merchantmen were sunk, while a German armed trawler, which arrived at Nykoping, had 150 men aboard from a German destroyer that had been sent to the bottom. The German auxiliary cruiser was the Konig von Sachsen, which was seen to sink and it is supposed all of her crew were drowned."

## FATHER OF O. D. EBY, OREGON PIONEER, DIES

David Eby, father of O. D. Eby of this city and F. G. Eby of Sacramento, Cal., died Monday at Cottage Grove. The interment will be made at Harrisburg, Wednesday. Mr. Eby's son, Benjamin, died at Goshen, Oregon, last week. Mr. Eby left this city for Cottage Grove Monday afternoon. David Eby was one of the early Oregon pioneers, and resided in this city for several years with his son.

# VERDICT REACHED AFTERTWO HOURS OF DELIBERATION

GLADSTONE COUNCILMAN DOES NOT DENY TAKING MRS. STARK TO TOURIST HOTEL.

## REGISTERING AS MAN AND WIFE, DEFENDANT TERMS "INDISCRETION"

Mr. Goodman Testifies Trip to Portland Was Made to Discuss Business—Husband Overhears His Wife Make Date.

After deliberating a little over two hours a jury in the circuit court Tuesday returned a verdict of \$1000 for Ben E. Stark against F. E. Goodman, a member of the Gladstone city council, in an alienation suit in which Mrs. Stark was the woman in the case. The jury retired at 4:10 o'clock and returned with a verdict at 6:30. Stark sued for \$15,000.

The jury was selected with little trouble. Three jurors, including F. P. Nelson and J. H. Hollowell, fellow townsmen of Goodman, were rejected by the defense. The third was George J. Hall. The jury was composed of W. H. Bair, D. B. Fox, W. A. Garner, Solon Kinser, Seth Young, A. G. Phelps, John A. Ridings, George H. Brown, John J. Hattan, J. T. Evans, W. H. Graale and John Wise. George C. Brownell and Charles T. Sievers represented the plaintiff, W. M. Stone and Charles Monkton, the defendant.

Mrs. Stark, the woman in the case, did not appear at the trial. Stark, himself, went on the stand in his own behalf, reviewing the incidents which lead to his finding Goodman and Mrs. Stark together in the Tourist hotel in Portland.

On the morning of April 17, he said, when his wife thought he was in Milwaukie he was on the top step of the steps into the basement of his home in Gladstone. He heard Goodman and Mrs. Stark make a date to meet that afternoon in Portland, he testified. Later he went to Portland himself, followed the couple to the Tourist hotel and induced the woman in charge, Mrs. Graham, to knock on the door and let him in. They found Goodman and Mrs. Stark in the room.

Neighbors Testify.

Lester Evon and his mother, Jennie Evon, who live near the Stark home said they saw Goodman go to the Stark home several times. The only other witness for the plaintiff was Mrs. M. Walker, landlady of the Tourist hotel who said that her sister, Mrs. Graham was in charge April 17.

The defense did not deny the visit to the Tourist hotel. Goodman himself acknowledged that he visited the place with Mrs. Stark and that the door to the room was locked. He termed his act of registering at the hotel as Mr. and Mrs. Jones as an "indiscretion."

He said he first became acquainted with the Stark family when he bought eggs from them.

Portland Trip Business One.

He went to her home on the morning of April 17, he said, following an accidental meeting on the streetcar. She complained of her husband's treatment of her and wished to talk over the matter with him. They decided that it would be best to talk over the matter in Portland and went down that afternoon.

They discussed business and money only in the Tourist hotel, he declared, and had no thought of wrong doing, although he became suspicious and had started to leave the room when Stark and Mrs. Graham knocked on the door.

Elpha Goodman, wife of the defendant, also went on the stand for the defense, declaring that her husband could not have made the visit to the Stark home without her knowing of it. C. W. Parrish, of Gladstone, who has known Goodman since 1881, said that he lived on the road between the Goodman and the Stark homes, and saw Goodman go to the Stark home only once, on the morning of April 17.

Albert M. May, a Portland painter, once a partner of Goodman, testified that Stark and his wife frequently quarreled when they lived in Portland.
