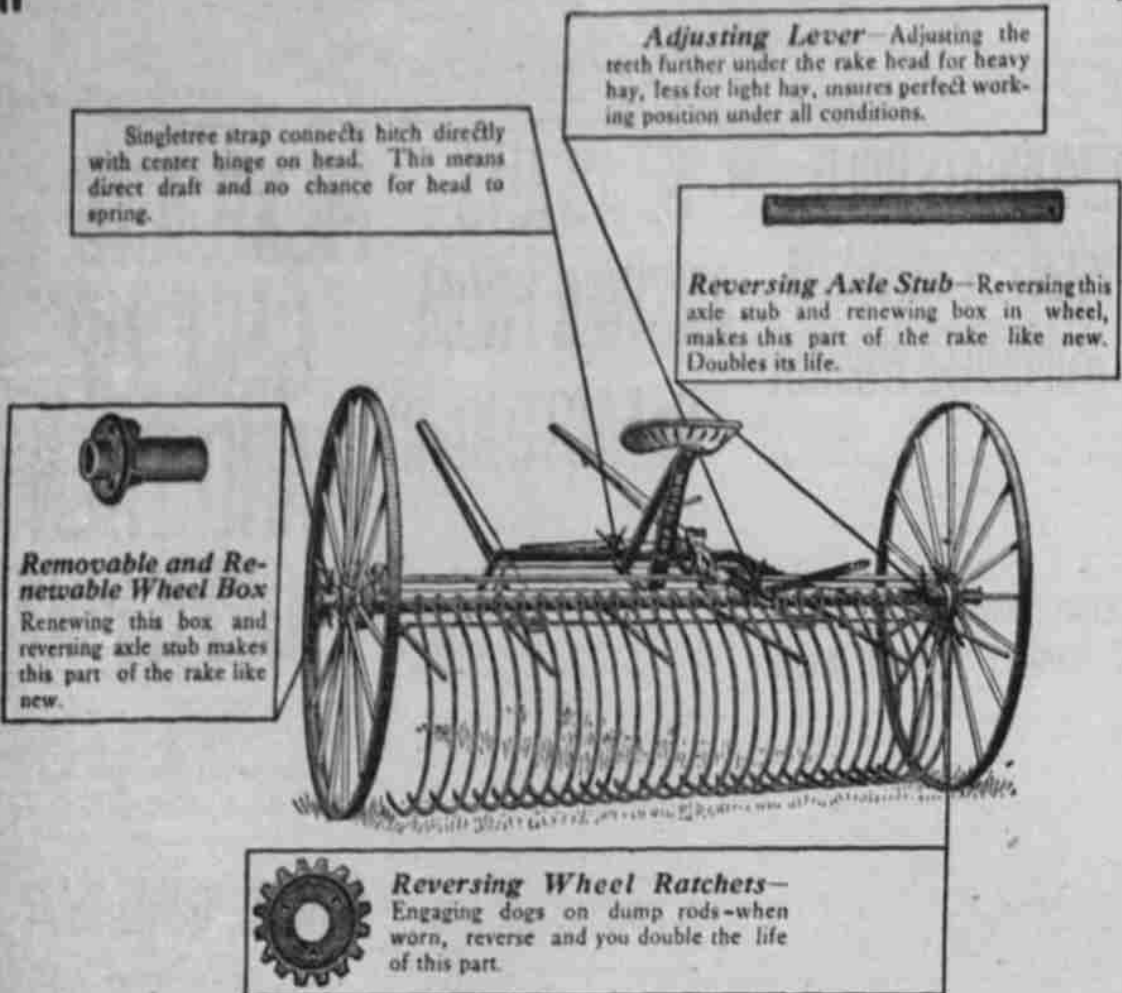

SHOWERS ENCOURAGE MACKSBURG FARMERS

GOOD CROPS ARE NOW PRACTICALLY ASSURED—CORN IS THRIVING.

MACKSBURG, Ore., June 22.—(Special.)—The apprehension of early drought caused by the drying winds and high temperature of last week have been set at rest by a succession of copious showers. This moisture combined with the heat has so greatly accelerated vegetable growth that all fear of a belated harvest and possible loss from mid-summer frosts have disappeared.

The corn, which was yellow and puny from cold, is thriving in the present warmth and quite as forward as ever heretofore. Potatoes are doing nicely, the early ones nearly ready to use, while wheat, barley and oats are promising as fine a yield as ever before.

Fruit is holding out the prospect of a bountiful harvest. Apples are abundant and of excellent appearance. The early ones will be ready to take the place of strawberries as these begin to decline. Raspberry and loganberry bushes are bending under their load of fruit, while plum and pear trees are equally well filled. The wild blackberry vines show no sign of failing and beside the summer enjoyment of this favorite fruit, many a pantry shelf will be stored with them in preservation for winter use.

The annual school meeting was held Monday. L. Jones was elected director and Wesley Yoder clerk. A special school tax of two mills was voted.

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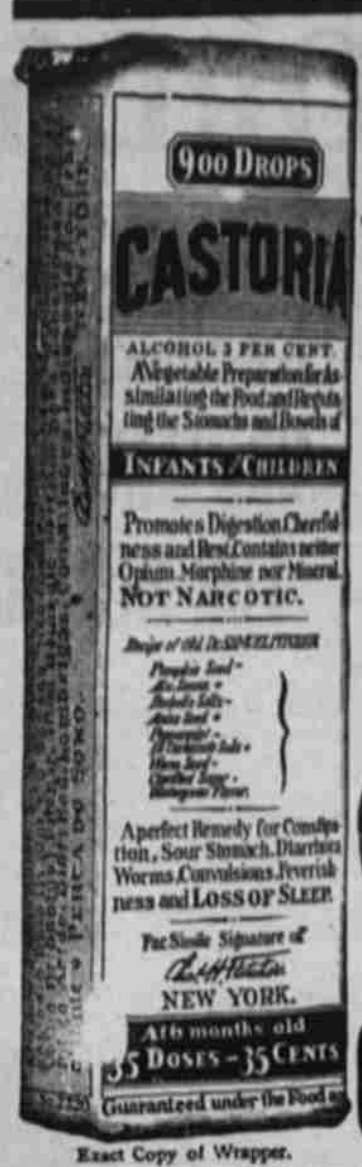
