

Villa Bites Pete, Of G Company

CAMP WITHYCOMBE, Ore., June 28.—(Special.)—Villa and Carranza, both showing their vicious temper, arrived at the camp of G company this evening. Villa had not been in camp five minutes before she bit "Long Pete," as one of the soldiers of the Oregon City contingent of the National Guard is familiarly known among his camp-mates; and Long Pete at once requested County Coroner W. E. Hempstead, who happened to be on the scene, to prescribe for him.

"You'd better go down to the hospital corps at once and report in," said the doctor, "otherwise you may be disabled from going to war."

"Hugh," said Pete, scornfully, "I've been bitten by snakes and cougars and mad dogs, and I guess one little bite from Villa won't hurt me any."

It will be observed in the above the Villa is spoken of as a "she." In the present account this is correct, for the Villa and Carranza that arrived at G company's camp tonight are cub bears, caught some weeks ago by a forest ranger at Estacada, and tonight presented to G company by Oregon City citizens as mascot. The female bear, which has the meaner disposi-

tion of the two, is named Villa; and the other cub, which is merely a playful ball of fur, has been dubbed Carranza.

A purse for the purchase of the bears was made up by popular subscription in the business district of the county seat Thursday, and in the evening the presentation party visited the mobilization camp. O. B. Eby made the speech of presentation on behalf of the citizens, and those in the party that escorted the bears to camp were Justice John Sievers, M. D. Latourette, E. E. Brodie, Christian Schaefer and Coroner W. E. Hempstead.

A good-sized crowd of Oregon City folk, and many soldiers from the camps of other units of the National Guard, watched the simple ceremony that accompanied the gift. Immediately after the bears had been transferred to the Oregon City militiamen, Carranza climbed an oak tree and took a survey of the situation, while Villa tried with more or less success to bite everyone within reach. After Carranza was recaptured the Oregon City boys paraded their mascot up and down the main thoroughfare of the mobilization camp, and were envied by all.

CHARGE IS DROPPED AGAINST GUARDSMAN

CLAIR HARPOLE, OF OAK GROVE, NOW IS MEMBER OF PORTLAND COMPANY.

Because Clair Harpole, of Oak Grove, joined one of the Portland companies of the National Guard, Clackamas county officials have decided to drop a charge of violating the prohibition law, which was made against him early in the week.

Harpole is alleged to have broken into a house in Oak Grove and stole a bottle of wine, which he passed around among his friends. District Attorney Hedges decided to charge him with violating the prohibition law rather than with burglary, and a complaint was filed. Investigation by Sheriff Wilson and Constable Frost revealed the fact that Harpole went to Portland with the intention of becoming a guardsman. When they received definite word that Harpole had joined, the charge was dismissed.

WIFE WOULDN'T COOK HE SUES FOR DIVORCE

Mrs. L. M. Green wouldn't cook. Furthermore, she had no desire to go out in society with her husband, so he alleges in a complaint filed Thursday in the circuit court. They were married May 9, 1909, in Portland.

Lewis Carthens instituted an action in the circuit court Thursday against J. S. Trimble, asking that he be given \$25 damages and that he be given possession of property owned by the defendant under terms of a lease signed by the Northwest Holding company, who recently sold the land in question to Trimble. Carthens alleges the new owner refuses to recognize the lease.

Bertha H. Smith secured a judgment against the Northwest association, foreclosing on a mortgage for \$100. She was given \$153 interest and \$100 attorneys' fees.

HIGHLAND TO HOLD SPECIAL ELECTION

A special election will be held in the Highland precinct July 14 when the voters will decide whether stock will be allowed to run at large in the outlying parts of the precinct. The Highland district voted some time ago to keep stock out of the roads, but the farmers living in the more mountainous parts of the precinct are asking that they be allowed to run stock at large, leaving the more thickly populated part of the precinct under the present stock restrictions. Although this question affects only a part of the precinct, the entire Highland precinct will vote on the question.

ALLEGED BIGAMIST ONCE MARRIED HERE

"Dr." Sherman O. Crawford, now facing a charge of bigamy, married Frances M. Cummins at Parkplace April 23, 1913, Rev. J. L. Jones performing the ceremony. March 4, 1914, she filed a suit for divorce in the Clackamas county circuit court, alleging that he deserted her a month after the marriage. She also charged cruelty and non-support. She was granted a decree and allowed to take her maiden name.

WIFE WON'T COOK, SO HE WANTS DIVORCE

Alleging that his wife refused to cook for him, S. Miller Monday filed a suit for divorce in the Clackamas county circuit court. He further declares that she would visit him at his place of work for the purpose of annoying him and that she often struck him. Stone & Moulton filed the suit for Mr. Miller and service was secured immediately upon the defendant. Mr. Miller, as she was at the court house at the time the complaint was filed.

Circuit Judge Campbell signed a decree Monday divorcing Charles McGeechie from Winnie McGeechie, of Gladstone.

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Captaincy of New Company In Doubt

Announcement in Portland that Judge Gantenbein, who is among the leading spirits in planning a regiment of volunteers to be known as the Fourth Oregon Infantry, had picked G. W. Martin to be captain of the proposed company to be organized in Oregon City has caused considerable discussion in county seat circles. Much dissatisfaction has been expressed by the methods of "hand picking the officers" adopted by Judge Gantenbein, and it is openly said in some quarters that if the appointment of Mr. Martin to the captaincy of the local company is forced, enlistments will be few and far between.

Local men who would volunteer to join this regiment do not desire to cast any reflection upon Mr. Martin's military record. They recall that he went to the Philippines with the company composed of Oregon City and Woodburn men who served in the Spanish-American war, and that he gained promotion to a lieutenant's rank while in service. But since then he has dropped out of touch with other members of the company, and has not shown any marked interest in military affairs. In fact he had been almost forgotten until his name appeared in Portland papers as the man who had been picked to command the local company.

Captain H. E. Williams, on the other hand, whom local men have regarded as the logical commander of the proposed Oregon City company, is not

only generally popular, but has shown a steady interest in the militia and in military affairs for the past four years, and has been urging the formation of a company of volunteers here. That Captain Williams is also favorably known in Portland is shown by his selection by Judge Gantenbein as first lieutenant of the Oregon City company.

Local men, however, feel that Captain Williams should be given command of the company it is proposed to form here. At least 30 prospective members of the company have been secured through the efforts of Captain Williams, and many of these men say that they would not join under another commanding officer. Among these is W. A. Huntley, who was first lieutenant in the company that served in the Philippines, and who has a large circle of friends who are talking about volunteering in the new company.

Pressure will be brought to bear upon the Portland organizers of the volunteer regiment to reconsider the appointment of Mr. Martin as commander of the Oregon City unit, and to replace his name with that of Captain H. E. Williams. If such action is not taken, it is said, it is extremely doubtful if the local company will be formed, and it is even said that in place of it a separate troop of cavalry may be organized by the patriotic young men of the county seat district who desire to place themselves at the call of the government for service in the Mexican crisis.

ESTACADA FORCES UNITE

Visiting and inspecting the farms of the Estacada district and advising with the owners as to the best method of crop rotation, J. E. Larson, agronomist of the O. A. C. extension service, was engaged in extension work at Estacada June 19 to 21. The Estacada farmers are taking up their most important problems one-by-one and giving their best endeavor to their solution. In cooperation with them is the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, which made application for this work by Professor Larson. The Estacada business men are also joining hands in this movement for agricultural betterment, which, if it succeeds, brings better profits to the farmer, more business for the merchant, and larger tonnage for the transportation lines.

Willamette Water Plant Sold To W.L.

Arrangements for the purchase of the Willamette water system from James Downey by the city of West Linn were completed Wednesday. The consideration is \$2250 and the city will take over the plant today.

Willamette was recently annexed by West Linn, principally so that Willamette could get South Fork water which supplies the town directly across the river. Willamette has been supplied by the privately owned system.

The deal was completed after considerable negotiations. Mr. Downey and the city being unable to agree upon a price.

Improvements will be made in the Willamette system, and it will be necessary to connect with mains in the Willamette district with one of the main supply pipes from the West Linn reservoir before mountain water can flow in the plant bought Wednesday.

\$30,000 Is Being Spent For Schools

Clackamas county school districts have underway or are planning improvements which will total in cost about \$30,000. A significant feature of these improvements is that many of them are made with the aim of bringing the schools up to the state standardization requirements.

A summary of the other improvements follows:

Echo Dell: one room building, cost \$1400.

Hazella: one room, cost \$1500.

Oswego: modern playshed, cost \$1000.

Heasel, one or two room building, \$1800.

Corral Creek, Barlow, Twilight and other districts are planning improvements to bring the schools up to the state requirements.
