CITY COUNCIL ADOPTS PAVING RESOLUTION

W. N. COUNSELL OF MILWAUKIE SUCCESSFUL BIDDER—D. C. FINDLAY, ENGINEER.

OSWEGO, Ore., July 13.—(Special)—The regular meeting of the city council held July 6th, (Thursday), was held as per schedule.

Proposals were opened for the grading of Front street. Those tendering bids were, Federal Construction Co., of Vancouver, Wash.; W. H. Counsell, of Milwaukie, Ore.; and A. Waldorf, of Oswego.

On motion, D. C. Findlay was employed as engineer for the present improvement on Front street for \$125.00.

Kempin was appointed to wait on Mr. Findlay to ascertain the time an extra man or roadman would be required.

Councilmen Clinefelter and Diddan were appointed to act with Kempin to wait on Findlay and authorized to act by employment of the extra men.

The resolution calling for the grading of Front street for a width of six feet and extending north to south line of C avenue, beginning at point 28 feet north of the property line of B avenue at no greater cost than the price paid for the proposed grading under ordinance No. 54, and according to specifications for hard surfacing, was adopted.
