Not one of the plants were injured by the frost, stid there are hundreds of buds still to blossom out. It is probable that Mrs. Winkle will have these blessoms until Christmas time, There ore very few of the new kinds by hundreds of the old fashioned varties with their colors of plak, yellow, red, purple, white and varigated corors. There are four large plants, each bearing three colored varieties, one of the bright crimson, another of a dellcate shade of pink, and the third a varigated color of pink and red.

Hundreds of blosmous have noes incked from these bushes, and they have bloomed constantly since the first of May. They have not received careful attention by the grower. These oseoms are from plants that were planted on the old home place of Mrs. Winkle's parents, the late Frederick and Dorthy Rakel, who bettled at Canemah near this city 35 years ago, In the early spring they were transplanted to the Winkle home at West Linn, where they are now attracting nusual attention.
