VETERAN OF SEVERAL WARS AND SOLDIER OF FORTUNE TALKS HERE

W. H. HARDY IS ONLY SURVIVING MEMBER FIRST PERRY EXPEDITION TO JAPAN.

W. H. Hardy, 80 years old, has fought to defend American lives and American principles in more than one corner of the globe. Under the folds of the Stars and Stripes he has sailed on man-of-war and merchantmen around the world. He is the only surviving member of the first Perry expedition to Japan in 1852. He fought through the Civil war from 1861 to 1866 and was severely wounded in the attack on Fort Fisher.

In China in the '60's he stood by his gun to protect lives of Americans at Hong Kong. After the Civil war he came to Oregon and then to Arizona in 1866 where he was deputy United States marshal until 1883. He fought in numerous Indian campaigns and chases after bandits of early days. He tried his luck in Alaska, but failed, and sailed to Europe from Portland in April, 1885, on the first steel sailing ship made in America. The crew mutined and he was almost killed on midocean.

His life has not been one of peace and rest. It has been one of adventure, of wars, of sailing the open sea, of battles of the desert. Eighty years old, but with the same old spirit, he knocked down a man in Portland last Sunday who dared to remark, "To hell with the American flag."

COAL FAMINE IS THREATENING THE EASTERN STATES

OKLAHOMA COAL STRIKE COMES WHEN FUEL STOCK OVER WIDE AREA IS LOW.

ONLY LIMITED SUPPLY ON HAND IN CITIES ALONG MISSISSIPPI

Dealers in West and Southwest Say Cold Wave Would Find People Unprepared and Serious Situation Would Result.

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 31—Prospect of a general strike tomorrow in the Oklahoma coal fields was regarded with apprehension here tonight in view of the reported scarcity of fuel in other parts of the country. Much of the coal used in the southwest comes from the mines in Oklahoma, several of which already have shut down and more than 98 per cent of which are affected by the strike unsettled dispute between operators and union miners over the biennial wage contract.

The strike order was made effective November 1. Only a limited supply of coal was reported tonight to be available in any of the larger cities of this section. In case of a cold wave and the consequent drain on the fuel on hand, dealers said much suffering would result. The same shortage of cars which was felt during the crop movement is handicapping shipments of coal. It was declared.

Prices so far, according to retail dealers, have made no substantial advance, but increases were predicted soon.

REVISION STATE CONSTITUTION IS LIVE WIRE TOPIC

COMMERCIAL CLUB BODY MAY AID PLAN TO STOP TINKERING WITH LAWS.

CAPTAIN WILLIAMS CHARGES WAR DEPARTMENT NOT BUSINESSLIKE

Chairman G. Company Fund Committee Explains Why \$309 Was Drawn to Pay for Government Rations Not Ordered.

Declaring himself in sympathy with the movement to prevent further tinkering with the constitution of Oregon, O. D. Eby, local attorney, at the luncheon of the Commercial Club Live Wires Tuesday indicated that he would favor the proposal of the Constitutional Revision association of Oregon, which is fathering a petition to the legislature to revise the constitution of the state.

The association, headed by Ex-Atorney General Crawford, maintains that the Oregon constitution is in conflict with the federal constitution and that it contains sections in conflict with other parts of the instrument. It is desired to safeguard the constitution from improper amendment and it is therefore proposed to have the legislature revise the constitution and submit the draft to the people at a special election. Mr. Eby, H. E. Cross and Dr. Clyde Mount were named as a committee to report their investigation of the proposal to the Live Wires at a meeting to be held November 14. Fred Lockley, formerly editor of the Pacific Monthly, talked to the Live Wires in support of the amendment for a new normal school at Pendleton, Live Wires Elect.

Captains Held Financially. "At the expiration of the 15 days, instead of allowing the company commanders a cash allowance which they could have got on the border when they did not need the provisions, the quartermaster department said they had to take rations or nothing. The result of this was that the company commanders when the troops were mustered out had left on their hands from \$150 to \$300 worth of government rations which the government refused to take back and forced the company commanders to pay for out of their own pockets.

"This certainly is a rank injustice to these men who went to the border and there must be something radically wrong with the administration of the war department's affairs at Washington if such condition is allowed to exist."

Unbusiness-like Methods Charged.

"In reading their report, you will notice a check for \$309.43 which was sent to the quartermaster at Fort Rosecrans for overdrat of rations by Captain Blanchard of G Company," said Captain Williams. "The company commanders were ordered to draw 15 days' rations upon leaving the border. They figured the amount of rations necessary in addition to what they had on hand, but the captain quartermaster evidently thought they did not know what they wanted and shipped
