WIFE SAYS HER HUSBAND THREATENED HER LIFE ANNIE BZOZOSKI SUES FOR DIVORCE HERE, CHARGING CRUELTY. After Salmon Bzozoski had spent his wife's \$350, earned by working as a laundress and in a woolen mill, he expected her 12-year-old son to support them, says Mrs. Annie Bzozoski in a divorce suit brought in the Clackamas county circuit court. She also alleges that he pointed a gun at her and threatened to take her life, that he failed to provide for her properly and that he finally left her. They were married June 15, 1914, at Hoquiam, Wash., and spent most of their married life at Rainier. She asks for \$1000 permanent alimony, and Circuit Judge Campbell Friday signed an order compelling the defendant to pay \$300 into the court for costs and expenses incident to her case. Paul C. WILBUR FIGHTS FOR POSTPONEMENT OF TRIAL SET FOR DECEMBER 8-9 DISTRICT ATTORNEY RECEIVES WORD THAT MOTION WILL BE FILED TODAY. District Attorney Hedges received word last night that C. W. Fulton, attorney for Julius Wilbur and others indicted with him on a charge of violating the state prohibition law, will file a motion for continuance this morning. The district attorney said that he would fight any attempt to delay for a second time the trial of Wilbur and his employes, which now is set for Friday and Saturday of this week. The trials were postponed from November 8 and 9 on motion of Wilbur, and District Attorney Hedges is much opposed to a second postponement of the case. Wilbur is proprietor of the Friars' club at Milwaukie which was raided by Sheriff Wilson and a posse the morning of October 1.

Fred Ballard, one of the well known pioneers of Oregon City, died at the family home in Mountain View addition Monday morning at 3 o'clock, after an illness of one month.
