SUFFRAGISTS BEGIN SILENT PICKETING" BEFORE WHITE HOUSE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10 .- Twelve women with suffrage banners stood at the main gates of the white house grounds today inaugurating what leaders of the Congressional Union for Woman Suffrage called mildly militant "silent picketing" to force their cause upon President Wilson's attention.

"Pickets" were at the two entrances from 10 o'clock this morning until dark, tired ones being relieved from time to time, and tonight it was said that other gates would be guarded tomorrow and daily until March 5, when the suffragettes plan to bring their campaign for federal amendment to a close with a big parade.
