LOCAL PEOPLE TO STRONGLY FIGHT CASCADE SCHEME

ROUSING MEETING AT COMMERCIAL CLUB SHOWS STRONG OPPOSITION

RESOLUTION PASSES UNANIMOUSLY OPPOSING ANY DIVISION WHATSOEVER

Heavy Taxpayers from Parts of The Proposed Territory Urge Local People to Fight Measure To a Finish

THE RESOLUTION

"Be it resolved that it is the sense of this meeting that we are unalterably opposed to any division or dismemberment of Clackamas county and we shall hold our representatives in both branches of the legislature personally responsible if any such division or dismemberment takes place."

In no uncertain terms, Clackamas county taxpayers stepped flat-footed on any and all proposed county division measures at an enthusiastic meeting in the Commercial club rooms Monday evening, attended by over fifty well known business, professional men and farmers.

Representatives from the proposed Cascade county urged local men to fight the scheme to a finish, while heavy taxpayers from other parts of the county participated in the big meeting. It was the unanimous sense of the meeting that the Commercial club committee continue the fight against the projects, and it was agreed that a large delegation, not only from Oregon City, but from the districts sought to be sliced off of the present boundaries, visit the legislative committee next Thursday evening.

N. E. Stingley of Eagle Creek, a well known rancher of that community who lives within four miles of Estacada, was one of the most vigorous opponents of the Cascade county scheme. James Tracy of Logan, W. A. Beck of Molalla, A. D. Burnett of Eagle Creek, and many others urged defeat of the scheme, while resolutions from two different granges, Pomona and Maple Lane, were reported to have been passed opposing the plan.

Plans for the special train to convey a delegation of the opponents to the plan to meet with the division committee were discussed, and in all probability about one hundred people from Eagle Creek, Logan and from

GERMAN RAIDER IS PROBABLY THE MOEWE; NO AMERICAN SHIPS ARE LOST, SAYS PERNAMBUCO CONSUL

RIO JANEIRO, Brazil, Jan. 18.—It is considered almost certain here that the German sea raider which has been creating havoc among entente shipping in the South Atlantic is the Moeve, the German armed raider which captured the Appam and sunk numerous entente ships in Atlantic waters a year ago.

The American consul at Pernambuco cabled the embassy here confirming the landing of several Americans from vessels which fell victim to the raider. He said that no American ships had been sunk by the German craft and

that all the American sailors landed were men from the crews of foreign vessels.

According to reports from an authoritative source, the Moeve is understood to have sailed from Kiel under the Danish flag, carrying a cargo of hay on the bridge in order to conceal her armament. When last seen the Moeve was painted black with white markings.

Her armament included four torpedoes in service and several tubes in reserve. She is believed to have carried a mine-laying apparatus.

CLACKAMAS LEGISLATORS PLAN MERGER OF BOARDS; BROWNELL WOULD MOVE DEADLINE NORTH

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 18.—(Special to the Enterprise)—Senator Dimick and Representative Brownell each gathered his little rival flock together today to discuss consolidation. While Dimick was consulting with his senate committee Brownell marched his men to the governor's office where the executive explained his consolidation ideas and answered questions. No definite action was taken by either the house or senate committee today and the two committees appeared no nearer harmony than they were yesterday.

Brownell introduced the following bills today: \$5,000 appropriation for a pioneer monument at Champoo; prohibiting salmon fishing on the Willamette river north of a line 6000 feet below the present fish ladder; \$10,000 appropriation for the entertainment of the Grand Army of the Republic national encampment when it meets in this state; prohibiting dealing in salmon caught with hook and line during the season when catching the same with traps or gill net is prohibited.

Dimick introduced the "lazy husband" bill prepared by District Attorney Neuner of Douglas county which gained considerable notoriety. It provides a penalty for non-support and that the husband must support family or go to jail.

Dimick's "drunken driver" automobile bill passed on third reading in the senate today unanimously.

GERMAN CONSUL BOPP AND AIDE BOTH RELIEVED

GERMAN EMBASSY VOLUNTARILY REMOVES CONVICTED SAN FRANCISCO DIPLOMAT

NEW CHARGES AGAINST CONVICTED MEN DECLARED TO BE POSSIBLE

Trial, on Allegation of Using Mails to Further Murder and Arson Will Follow Reversal, Says Federal Prosecutor

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—Count von Bernstorff, the German ambassador, today informed the state department in a note that he had relieved from duty Franz Bopp and E. H. von Schack, respectively consul-general and vice-consul at San Francisco, recently convicted of violating the neutrality of the United States by conspiring to destroy munitions consigned to the entente allies.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 12.—Conspiracy to use the United States mail in furtherance of murder and arson will be charged against Franz Bopp, German consul-general, and his four aides if the convictions for conspiracy to violate American neutrality with dynamite and bombs is overturned, John W. Preston, United States district attorney, declared today.
