The Would-Be Legislative Boss!

After conducting, for more than two years, a compaign, full of liftternosa, of unfairness and misrepresentation, and after seeing its illstarred promotion go down to defeat at the hands of the senate committee on assessment and taxation, the Portland Journal, stung to the quick at the unwillingness of the members of the legislature to obey its dictation, has resorted to the most diabelical attack on the country press of Oregon that this state has ever witnessed.

In 1907, the state legislature, under the whip of the Journal, and without due regard for the true situation in the countles of the state outside of Multnomah, repealed the law providing for the publication of the delinquent tax list. At the following session two years later, the legislative assembly, following a demand from the people, re-exacted the law, which was promptly vetoed by Governor Chambertain, acting under instructions from his political maker, the Journal. In 1911, the legislature again enacted the law, providing for the publication of the tax list in two newspapers in countles of more than 10,000 people, and in one newspaper in counties of less than 10,000, but through the peculiar influence of the Multnomah county delegation, tacked on a rider that compelled the publication of the delinquent list in all the daily newspapers of Portland.

Since that time the Journal has published the tax list annually and despite its protestations that the law has been "pork" for the Portland papers, is has accepted the publication, and has not refused it, and has taken its regular space rates in payment thereof.

While the country press has at all times been willing to consent to the abolishment of the conditions incident to the law that compel the publication of the delinqueent list in four Multnomah newspapers, against two papers in other counties of the state, the newspapers in the state outside of Portland have presented a solid front against the cournal's attempt to bring the family quarrels of its county into the legislature and play them against the interests of up state counties. where there is no demand for the repeal of the law, except from those "sharks" who have been getting rich through the quiet purchase of tax titles and who are not able, because of the publication of the tax list, to pursue their nefarious business without hinderance

The Journal is now engaged in a frantic effort to whip the legislature into taking such action that will siap in the face the country press, who ask only from the legislature that they be left alone and that the fights of Multnomah be settled as to the merits of the case as it con-

We shall see just how far this destroyer of the Republican party in Oregon is going to dictate to a Republican legislature.
