SCHOOL GIRLS' QUARTET WILL SING AT CONCERT OREGON CITY HIGH SINGERS ON PROGRAM—ONE-ACT COMEDY ALSO IS BILLED.

HENRY JAEGER TAKING SHORT COURSE AT O. A. C. CLACKAMAS COUNTY BOY HAS A LONG RECORD OF PRIZES AND AWARDS.

Henry Jaeger, the young man of Clackamas county who made a profit of \$118.35 on three acres of seed wheat last year, is one of the attendants of the short course at the Oregon Agricultural college.

Young Jaeger was a member of the boys' and girls' club work last year, enrolling in the agricultural work and carrying the seed grain course. On his three acres which he had for the contest, he raised 93 bushels of seed wheat of which he sold 40 bushels for seed at \$2.50 per bushel. Considering the remainder to be worth \$1 a bushel he will have received for the 93 bushels \$153. This was grown at a cost of \$34.15 leaving him a net profit of \$118.85.

Henry first exhibited at the Clackamas county fair held in Cenby, winning first place in his project. The exhibit was then sent to the state fair at Salem by School Superintendent Calavan, along with the children's exhibit of Clackamas county. Young Jaeger again carried off first honors for this seed grain course of the agricultural club in the state, the prize being a trip to the summer school for boys and girls held at the college each summer, but he preferred to attend Farmers' Short Course because he was needed on the farm during the summer. This trip is financed by C. C. Colt, of the Union Meat company at Portland, who willingly agreed to permit the change.

Young Jaeger's work in the short course is along agricultural and general farm lines. He is busy every minute of the time. His instructors say that he has a splendid grasp of the general subjects of agriculture. When he was interviewed he said: "If it were not for club work I should not be here at this time. The instructions received here from the college through club work and also by coming into contact with the different work enabled me to produce the crop I raised last year and win this prize. If I had never won a prize the training I received by following the instructions would have well paid me for my efforts. I want to be a farmer and a good one. I like livestock and hope to be able to prepare myself to be a successful farmer."

SAMMY MORRIS, WHO HOLDS UP SMOKER FOR MORE MONEY, LICKED BONUS IS PAID, AND THEN PORT. LAND SCRAPPER IS BEATEN—CARD IS GOOD.

Sammy Morris, somewhat elated over the success of recent bouts in Portland, held up the main event of the Falls City Athletic club smoker Tuesday night for 46 minutes, demanding a bonus for his appearance here. Rather than disappoint the large crowd present Manager Johnson finally yielded to his insistent demands. When the bout finally got under way Sammy took a shell trouncing at the hands of a Shell McCool, also of Portland, and at the same time made himself rather unpopular with Oregon City fans.

The final round of the McCool-Morris headliner was one of the fastest seen here in a long time. McCool knocked his opponent flat in the first canto, took the second and third rounds and came back strong in the sixth. Morris landed three terrific rights in the fourth and had a shade in the fifth.

The stalling of Morris for more money was the only disagreeable feature of the evening but the fans were good natured. Aside from the first bout, when Kid Pluto dodged Joe Ferrel for six rounds in real amateurish style, the card was an all-star affair. Carl Martin and Jimmy Moscow put up a hard clean, scrap, the latter seeming to have a slight advantage in the early part of the battle, and driving in a jaw-breaker in the third which seemed to daze the local fighting machine, Martin, it usual, came back strong however, and the last three rounds it was a give-and-take proposition. These boys were evenly matched and Referee Shepherd's decision was a popular one.

Buck Smith of Astoria secured a decision over Ping Bodie of Portland. Ping failed to show the class of his former appearances here, while Smith, who has been coming ahead by jumps, was in great form, and gave the veteran a considerable punishment. Freddie Lowe of Portland took the measure of Eddie Olson of Seattle in one of the prettiest and hardest fought battles of the evening. Lowe made a big hit with local boxing fans. He is fast and shifty and a clean boxer at all times. Olson showed himself a game lad and stood up before Lowe's terrific drives without flinching. The last canto of this match was also a hummer, both lads being on the jump every moment.

The curtain raiser comedy between fighting Bill Maddox and his old-time rival, Admiral Freddie Mack, was omitted from the card for reasons known only to the management. Another large crowd enjoyed the smoker. Manager Johnson may stage a go between Valley Trambitte and Al Somers, two of the cleverest boys in the northwest at the next club smoker here. All the bouts last evening were clean, and the management is to be congratulated on the general excellence of the program. Referee Ralph Shepherd again gave excellent satisfaction.

Clackamas County Institutions Visited

The word institution is a misnomer. It makes one think of a square building with brick walls and a heating plant. The committee appointed by the state board of health to report the condition of state-aid charitable institutions to the legislature, Tuesday, stepped within the walls and found the children. At once the equipment only figured in relation to the present happiness and future welfare of these little ones.

The inspectors found at St. Agnes Baby Home near Oregon City, 90 tiny bits of drift washed up by the sorrid waves of perversion, misfortune and blood taint. One weighed less than when it was born—little, weakened, old man, from whose wrinkled face stared unblinking eyes of protest at such an introduction into a world that is sad enough at the best. This child was conceived and born within the state insane asylum, and three other children of the same mother were in the home.

A third of the smallest babies were defective in mind and body. Some had rickets which means knobby ribs and pigeon breasts and angular heads. One told of the sin and disease of its parents in the sore excrescences of skin that, by all the right to be well born, should have been baby pink.

One could never get away from the eyes. Some were set at unnatural angles. Nor the faces, for some of them seemed stamped with the hopeless sorrow of all time transmitted through the misdoings of a parentage thoughtless of the burden and handicap it was laying upon the innocent who must also expiate their guilt. It was pathetic to hear them try to sing. Out of such materials the effort was being made to build up a citizenship freed from degeneracy that will represent not a menace but an asset to the state.

St. Agnes home is a large structure built for other purposes and adapted with some difficulty to its present uses. The sisters in attendance minister, of course without pay, and there was evidence that they are doing their patient best to serve a necessity which no critic of whom I know has undertaken stultically to meet. In connection with the home are 50 acres of farm land and a dairy that produces vegetables, milk, cream and butter.

Christie Home, near Oswego, like the St. Agnes home, also in Clackamas county shelters 150 girls from 6 to 18 and one small boy. It was built for the purpose. The children are of a better type and more wholesome in appearance. While you can always detect the institutionalized child in contrast with the buoyant vitality and glee of little folks born of love in good homes, yet their songs and play and lessons showed the happy power to regenerate from a checkmated beginning that has kept humanity advancing during all the generations. The home is excellently conducted.

The inspections will continue until all institutions for orphans, foundlings and wayward girls, that receive aid from the state, have been reported on both as to administration and the condition of the inmates. The purpose, as expressed in the appointment, is not to prepare a brief for, say, sectarian institutions, but to provide the state with all information so that it can reform its policy of caring for these, its wards, intelligently and do them no injustice while preparing a system that will segregate the wholesome from the infected, the normal from the abnormal, with adequate provision for all. The legislature has been asked to defer its action relative to state-aided institutions until the information which is to be furnished without cost to the state, has been secured. The inspectors of Tuesday were Dr. Joseph Bilderback, Dr. Charles U. Moore, Dr. Mae H. Cardwell, Dr. David N. Roberts, state health officer, and the writer.

COUNTY SPLIT IS CAUSE OF WARM DEBATE AT SALEM

117 ANTI-DIVISIONISTS AND 123 FROM ESTACADA EXCHANGE MUCH SARCASM.

CASCADE BOOSTERS FEAR HEAVY O. C. VOTE, DON'T WANT ELECTION

Portland Sportmen and Clackamas County Net Fishermen Appear Before Senate Committee—Deadline Shift Opposed.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 25.—(Special to the Enterprise)—With 117 Clackamas boosters jammed on one side of the hall of representatives and about 125 Cascade boosters on the other, cheers, whoops and shouts punctured the liveliest night session since the legislature opened when the Cascade and Clackamas factions presented the merits of their respective contentions tonight.

Walter Givens, of Estacada, leader of the Cascade faction, outlined their plan and stated openly that the reason for their appealing before the legislature with a plea for a new county was based on the heavy Oregon City vote which would swamp the plan if they followed the method prescribed by law. He outlined the general idea involved and made a strong bid for a change.

Eby Leads Anti-divisionists. O. D. Eby, president of the Oregon City Commercial club, who led the opposition asserted that candidates who had failed to find a political berth saw a chance of landing soft beds if county division carries. He declared that it was a local issue with which the legislature should not meddle, and that the divisionists should follow the plan provided by statute relating to county divisions.

Expert accountant Whitcomb, of Portland, gave a detailed statement relative to taxes. Those speaking for new county were C. W. Devore, Estacada; F. W. Beckwith, Estacada; E. W. Bartwell, Estacada. The heads of granges of various precincts such as Eagle Creek and Springwater all spoke favoring division. The plan was opposed by J. W. Roots, Boring; Paul Meing, Sandy; and many others. The meeting continued until late.

Sarcasm But No Bitterness. Large petitions were mentioned by each side. The meeting was the occasion of much hilarity, and while sarcasm and sharp shots were hurled back and forth there seemed to be no indication of bitterness. Much talk hinged on economy a strong point being made by those opposed to county division that a split of the county would mean much greater expense. The joint fish committee tonight heard arguments from the anglers and representatives on the question of moving the dead line at Oregon City from its present location to a point two and one-half miles below the Clackamas rapids.

Joseph E. Hedges of Oregon City declared against the movement. A. L. Moulton, a Portland attorney, appeared for the anglers and favored the removal, which was recommended by the state fish and game commission and strongly favored by the anglers. Over 50 anglers were here from Portland and several net fishermen came from Oregon City. R. L. Clanton, master fish warden, was among those appearing. Arguments from both sides were extended and covered much of the same ground as biennially covered when the question hops up before the legislature.
