

VILLA LEADER SLAYS 5 CHINESE, NOW HE'S DEAD

JUAREZ, Mex., Feb. 16.—Five more Chinese were murdered at Matamoros, Chihuahua, when Julio Acosta, a Villa commander, raised that town on February 8, according to a message received here today by a relative of the Chinese. The Villa followers raided the Matamoros stores and carried off much loot, the message added. At military headquarters today it was said that Maximiano Marquez, in command of a force of homeguards, later pursued Acosta to the mountains and killed the Villa leader in battle.

'PLEASE TAKE DOWN FLAG' SAY GERMANS TO OUR MR. WHITLOCK, OF BRUSSELS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15.—State department advice today reported officially that Brand Whitlock, American minister to Belgium, had been requested, but not ordered by the German military authorities to lower the American flag from the legation in Brussels.

Deutschland Nabbed; Sailor Says He Saw Her in English Port

BALTIMORE, Feb. 16.—That the merchant submarine Deutschland had been captured and that she was in Plymouth Harbor with 185 other German submarines was the statement made here today by William Palmer, second engineer of the American transport liner Mongolia. Palmer said that the British had captured 400 enemy submarines and that 157 of them were in Plymouth. Captain Koenig, commander of the submarine freighter and his crew are in English jails, said Palmer.

BRITISH GAIN 1000 YARDS IN GIGANTIC SMASH

Zeps Fizzle Out And Raids Against London Are Stopped

GENEVA, Feb. 19.—The Zeppelin campaign against London has been found to be unprofitable. The cessation of German air attacks on the British metropolis after the latest appearance of the big dirigibles over the city last fall has been due, not to fortuitous circumstances, but to the deliberate determination of the German leaders to abandon these attacks, as has long been done in the case of Paris.
