SHIP YARD PLANS PROGRESS NICELY

MILWAUKIE, Oregon, May 9.—

Preliminary work looking toward the establishment of a big ship building and equipping plant along the Milwaukee waterfront continues with unabated zest and interest.

That everything is shaping itself satisfactorily is the word given to The Press by Capt. R. Chittcott, of the New Era Ship building company, which concern is back of the proposed local project.

It became known here this week that officials of the company were seeking to make arrangements with the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, for the lease of the big brick building on Front street formerly used as a car barn and repair plant, for a modern shop. Engineers of both companies have made a survey and estimate of the probable cost of repair of the building which has been forwarded to the head offices of the railroad people for sanction and definite action.

In the meantime it has also become known that there is a possible chance of the government taking over the proposed yards for the time being for the construction of wooden vessels as a part of the war department's program in combating the submarine menace. Whether this be so or not will not likely affect the location of the yards here.

Capt. Chittcott and other officials expect to come to Milwaukie next week when details and definite plans and other data will be given out.

TRY TO GET RANGE LAND

BEND, Or., May 11.—With the intention of turning practically valueless logged off lands into valuable cattle and sheep range, the Brooks-Scanlon Lumber company is fencing 3000 acres near Bend, representing the cut of the last 11 months. The natural growth of bunch grass will be encouraged and experiments with other dry land grasses will be carried on.

MINISTER IS ACCUSED OF EIGHT MURDERS IN VILLISCA, IOWA

DES MOINES, Iowa, May 14.—Rev. Lyn George J. Kelly, aged 35, an itinerant minister of Sutton, Nebraska, is in jail at Red Oak, Iowa, accused of the murder of eight persons in Villisca, Iowa, in 1912.

State Attorney General H. M. Hayner, who made this announcement here this afternoon, stated that with Kelly's indictment and arrest, the mystery of the famous Villisca six murders is solved.

Evidence on which the indictment was based, said Hayner, included a statement Kelly is reported to have made on the morning following the crime, that he had "heard the thud of the ax as it cleaved the skulls of eight persons murdered in the home of Joe Moore at Villisca."
