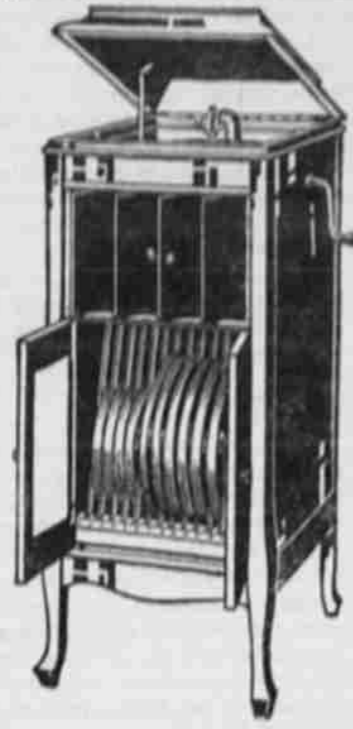

DEADLOCK IN CHINESE CABINET IS ENDED BY DEPOSING OF PREMIER

PEKIN, May 23.—President Li Yuan Hung has issued a mandate dismissing Premier Tuan Chi Jui from office and naming Dr. Wu Ting-Fang, ex-Ambassador to the United States, as acting premier and empowering him to form a new cabinet.

This action probably will end the deadlock in parliament and make possible a declaration of war by China against Germany.

The provincial military governors who were attempting to disband parliament left Peking before the president took action against Tuan Chi Jui, as the president had positively announced that he would disregard their demand for a dissolution of the legislative body.

The president declared that parliament must not be coerced in any way and announced his intention to conduct the government in accordance with the provisional constitution at any cost.

Holds Session

WOMEN'S CLUB ASKS THAT GAS COMPANY BE PERMITTED TO INSTALL GAS.

OSWEGO, Ore., May 24.—City council met in regular session May 17. All were present excepting Councilman Clinesfelter. Minutes of last meeting were read and approved. A communication was received from the Women's Club asking the council to grant the Portland Gas Company a franchise to furnish gas in Oswego. Mr. Strong, of the gas company being present, the mayor gave him the privilege of stating his wishes in regards to the franchise, which he submitted to the council at a previous meeting held in April. Mr. Cooper and others present also talked in favor of the council granting the franchise to the gas company, but the council stated that it could not, and would not grant the franchise in its present form, and tried to show the gentleman wherein the said franchise did not meet within the requirements of the city charter. Mr. Strong seemed to be willing to amend the franchise as asked, but only in a verbal way and the charter requires it in writing. It is to be hoped that the gas company and city council can agree in some way, so that the franchise can be granted.

I. N. Webster asked the council to lay a sidewalk from First and C to his residence on Front and C. The communication was placed on the table.

On motion by Pollard, the recorder was instructed to notify Dr. Rositter to attend to the sewer leading from his residence to Front street.

An amendment to ordinance No. 53, with an emergency clause attached, relative to using explosives within the city limits, was presented by D. B. Fox, and on roll call was carried unanimously.
