ATTORNEY GENERAL IS DENIED CASH TO USE IN SEARCH FOR FRAUD

SALEM, Or., May 28.—The emergency board today passed back to the state land board and the attorney general the Pacific Livestock land fraud case. The emergency board did not flatly refuse to grant the deficiency appropriation asked by the attorney general to carry on further investigations into the merits of the prosecution of the case, but a resolution was adopted declaring that there is no necessity for authorizing any deficiency "at this time" and "the application of the attorney general for this specific purpose be and the same is hereby denied."

WASHINGTON, May 28.—Investigation by the senate naval affairs committee of the accident on the armed merchant ship Mongolia, in which two American Red Cross nurses were killed, was ordered today by the senate.
