DEMAND OF ALLIES IS SIGNAL TO WITHDRAW

ATHENS, June 12, via London.—King Constantine has abdicated in favor of his son, Prince Alexander. Premier Zaimis today made the announcement that Constantine had designated Prince Alexander as his successor.

PARIS, June 12.—A dispatch to the Havas agency from Athens says: "M. Jonnart has had a long conference with Premier Zaimis. He indicated that the entente desired greater security for the army of the east and the re-establishment of unity in the Greek kingdom."

LONDON, June 12.—Related dispatches from Reuter's correspondent at Athens, received in London today, report a visit by Senator Jonnart, of France, to Saloniki, and indicated he was expected later to visit Athens.

When the question of Senator Jonnart's mission came up in the house of commons today, through a question addressed to Lord Robert Cecil, the minister of blockade said the high commissioner had been appointed with a view to securing the unity of allied diplomacy in Greece and entrusted with the duty of securing control of Thessalian harvests.

STRIKERS RETURN TO WORK

With all of the men excepting Roy Ott ordered to return to work this morning or whenever their next regular shift begins after this morning, the strike situation at the Crown Willamette Paper company's plant Thursday night took a decided step toward a solution.

At a conference of the executive committee of the union men with Mr. McElain, and other company officials yesterday a settlement was agreed upon, the principal features of which follow:

The men will go ahead with their organizing but no one in the mill employ is to discriminate against union men. No efforts are to be made to intimidate the men who do not already belong to these unions.

Following the declaration of the strike last Thursday the local management declined to treat with representatives of the union, but has dealt with the executive committee of paper makers union. The distinction made was that all of these men were employed by the Crown company and that they had a perfect right to talk over the business affairs with them.

The manner of conducting the entire strike has been the subject of considerable comment throughout the city, because of the fact that there has been such universal order and good behavior. The demonstration of the men Wednesday afternoon when they crossed the bridge to the plant of the company for their pay checks was one of the facts referred to.
