

MARKET REPORT

PORTLAND, Or., June 11.—Strawberries were again in light supply yesterday and the market was firm. Very few Southern Oregon berries were received. Clarks, from Kennewick, brought \$3.75, and Marshalls, from The Dalles, sold at the same price. White Salmon berries brought \$4, and will be \$4.25 today.

The first green apples of the season were received from California and sold at \$1.25 per half box. Apricots were more plentiful and were quoted at \$1.75 to \$2.50, according to quality.

There has been practically no change in the market report for the past two days. Flour and potatoes as well as butter and eggs remain the same.

Among the vegetables that have arrived in the market during the past few days are turnips and carrots that are selling for five cents per bunch, with some other vegetables including radishes, onions, spinach and greens.

Cherries are selling at 15 cents per pound, and the first Washington strawberries have arrived from Kennewick. These are retelling at two boxes for 35 cents. The California berries are about a thing of the past. The Oregon berries are expected in large lots within a few weeks, and if the present weather continues, this will hasten the ripening of the berries. The Oregon berries have a flavor that other berries do not have, and many of the housewives have anxiously waited for their arrival in the local markets. This year's crop is at the present time encouraging to the growers.

PORTLAND, Or., June 13.—Cattle were the feature of the livestock market at the Portland Union Stock yards this morning with more real strength showing in that division than in all others combined. Killers have run short of steers and are seeking all they can get. This is the explanation for the strong market. The demand this morning far exceeded the supply. Hogs were a trifle stronger, although \$15.25 was still the top. The market for pigs is in an unsettled state. Every effort is being made to keep the pigs in the country but with prices easier at the yards and feed going up it's a conundrum what may be the result.

Sheep are firm and will continue so for some time to come. Receipts were 68 cattle, 9 calves, 210 hogs, 1532 sheep, a total of 9 carloads.

LONDON, June 12.—A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph from Amsterdam says Lieutenant Josef Schaumburg, the first German airman to use an airplane in battle, and also the first to throw bombs from an airplane, was shot down in the battle of Messines, falling dead inside the German lines.

PERSHING ARRIVES IN ENGLAND IN ADVANCE OF AMERICAN FORCES

LONDON, June 11.—General Pershing and his party arrived early this morning at a port in Great Britain.

The American general and his party were received by the officers of the port, the general commanding the district and the mayor. They were escorted from the dock by a band and a guard of honor.

General Pershing arrived in London this afternoon. He was welcomed by Walter Hines Page, the American ambassador; Lord Derby, secretary of state for war; Viscount French, commanding the British home forces, and other officers, including Lord Brooke, who will be attached to General Pershing's staff during his stay in England.

The expected arrival of General Pershing and his party has been kept a fairly close secret from the London public. Several floors of rooms in a hotel had been reserved for the American party and the hotel this morning was completely transformed by the placing of numerous sign boards, the installation of bureaus of information, etc., designed to make the most efficient possible use of the place as temporary American army headquarters.

Leading Americans in London appeared on the scene early today with credentials as members of various committees.

General Pershing and the twelve officers of his senior staff are to be guests of the British government at the Savoy.

LOCAL OFFICIALS TO BE GIVEN AUTHORITY TO SELECT SOLDIERS

WASHINGTON, June 11.—The war department was at work today on regulations for the second step in the army draft selection by lot of a proportion of young men registered, while the provost marshal general's office was compiling data on the registration Tuesday.

It may take a week or 10 days to complete the nation-wide tabulations. Then the war department will prescribe rules for drawing names of men who are to be examined before local or precinct exemption boards and for the composition of these boards and of boards of review to which those drafted may appeal. A call for a definite number of troops will be issued and each state will be notified to contribute a certain proportion and state authorities in turn will determine allotments for subdivisions.

Officials noted today that the returns received so far indicate that more than half of the men registered either claimed exemption or gave facts which might exempt them.

The war department may issue a guiding statement for boards of exemption, but actual decision on each case will be left to the local authorities. Emphasis is laid on the determination to prescribe no class exemptions, but to pass on cases individually.

Messages from governors all over the country show that there are relatively few shirkers to be dealt with. Already the machinery of the government is moving to bring these few to a reckoning.

The chief factor in bringing them to book, however, will not be legal processes. General Crowder and the forces of the department of justice place full reliance in the people themselves in bringing forward these shirkers.

The local exemption boards will almost equal in number the registration precincts. Assurance has been given that a man's own neighbors will be the judges to pass upon his case. There were more than 125,000 precincts and equal decentralization will characterize the exemption machinery.

President Wilson, upon whom the law imposes the duty of selecting and appointing all these boards, probably will delegate this authority to the state officials. Their loyal and enthusiastic response, exemplified in the registration, is certain.

SENATOR HINTS THAT UNPLEASANT AFFAIRS ARE BEING CONCEALED

WASHINGTON, June 11.—Senator Harding, Ohio, Republican, declared in the senate today that lack of public confidence was retarding subscriptions to the Liberty Loan and that in the interest of unity senators were withholding information which might call for investigation and shake the confidence of the American people in the conduct of the war.

LIQUOR SEIZED BY OFFICERS AT NEW ERA DEPOT

Twenty-two quarts of whiskey and a premium of two quarts of beer, were seized at the Southern Pacific freight depot at New Era by Sheriff W. J. Wilson, Deputy District Attorney Thomas Burke and Justice of the Peace John N. Blevens, just before midnight Wednesday.

The whiskey was carefully packed in a trunk with a blanket and a bathrobe used as filler to protect the paper cartons containing the liquor. A blind check was on the trunk. A letter, about the station who acted suspiciously was brought to this city and questioned but was released.

Tuesday night two suitcases of whiskey were taken from a Southern Pacific train, evidently intended to be used in the Rose Show celebrations in Portland.
