THE DALLES, Or., June 15.—Nathan Whealdon, one of the best known men in eastern Oregon, died at his home here this morning after an illness of several months. He was a former member of the Oregon state senate, and a pioneer realty dealer of this city. He was born of a pioneer family in Linn county and early in life went to eastern Oregon, where he became active in public life. The funeral arrangements have not yet been completed.

FOREST FIRES LEAVE TRAIL OF RUIN IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 18.—Two towns are in ruins today, with losses of hundreds of thousands of dollars to homes and other property, and three women are dead of shock and prostration as the toll of forest fires in three widely separated areas of Southern California. Santa Barbara and Carpinteria were menaced. Ventura is in the path of another one. Ojai, where 60 homes were burned, and Nordhoff, where only the bank and postoffice are left standing, were the two towns destroyed. The dead are: Mrs. John Warner, Mrs. Francis Marroquin and Miss Sawyer, a nurse. Shepard's Inn and Stanley park, famous mountain resorts near Carpinteria, are in ruins. The Gate school for boys was in the path of the fire early today. In the Castaic—Newhall district, 32 miles from Los Angeles, the fire which went through the village of Pico and burned oil wells valued at hundreds of thousands, is renewing headway and threatens greater damage. Every available man and automobile in Santa Barbara has been commandeered into service to battle the fire.

All speeders were going from 35 to 45 miles an hour when caught by Mr. Meads.

TUALATIN CLAIMS TWO LIVES; THIRD YOUTH HAS A NARROW ESCAPE SHERWOOD, Or., June 15.—Evan Owens, aged 16, son of a rural route mail carrier, John Owens, working out of this postoffice, and Will Christensen, aged 20, son of Louis Christensen, a farmer living near Cipole, a few miles from here, were drowned while taking a swim in the Tualatin river which passes through the Christensen place, this afternoon. Young Owens, Christensen and three other boys, among whom were James Fitch, son of Postmaster Fitch, of this place, and Christensen's younger brother, had been working on the Christensen farm, and late in the afternoon the proposal was made that all cool off by taking a swim. The Tualatin at this point is deep and just now there is a swift current. According to the stories from the survivors of the swimming party, the two victims were seized with cramps. Young Fitch, aged 15, who is a good swimmer, attempted to save the Owens boy, and once had him near shore as he came up the second time, but some member of the party kicked Fitch in the stomach accidentally, making him lose his grip on Owens, who then sank. He was saved by an overhanging limb. Hugh Brady, municipal grapple of Portland, found the bodies at 8 o'clock tonight, and an effort was made to resuscitate the boys with a pulmotor. The boys were found within ten feet of the place where they were last seen. FIVE SHOT IN GANG FIGHT NEW YORK, June 15.—Five men were shot here Sunday night in a gang fight in front of the Central opera house, Sixty-seventh street east of Third avenue.
