BUILDINGS DYNAMITED IN BATTLE WITH BLAZE

BAKER, Or., Aug. 13.—Reports from Sumpter at 7 o'clock tonight said that the fire was practically under control.

BAKER, Or., Aug. 13.—Sumpter, Oregon, is tonight a smoking mass of ruins.

The flames tonight were eating their way to the woods at the edge of the city and the hundreds of fire-fighters were trying desperately to subdue them before the blaze could get such a start in the dry timber that a forest fire might result.

The fire department and citizens did valiant work, but the water supply gave out 30 minutes after the fire started and left the workers powerless.

As a last resort the fighters dynamited the Sumpter drugstore, one of the principal business blocks of the town, owned by Jesse Edwards, but to no avail.

The blaze originated at 10 o'clock back of the kitchen of the Capital hotel, owned by A. J. Dohny and fanned by a strong wind, was soon beyond control. It jumped across Granite street, despite desperate efforts to stop the progress of the rushing flames and it soon became apparent that the town was doomed.
