

OLYMPIA, Wash., Sept. 12 .- The state public service commission, in a unanimous decision handed down to-

day, dismissed the complaint of the city of Seattle against the cancellation by the Puget Sound Traction Light & Power Company of its sale of 25 tickets for a dollar, the tickets to be good for a continuous ride without transfer. The commission declares that under present conditions in Seattle a 4-cent fare is unrenumerative, by a 5-cent fare is reasonable. Commutation rates for school children remain, the company asking no increase. 'The company's franchise calls for the 4-cent rate where the tickets are purchased at places designated.
