

GERMAN FORCES APPEAR AT OESSEL ON GULF OF RIGA

GERMAN ARMY WITH NAVY AND SUBMARINES OCCUPY THE CAPITAL—ARENBERG

RUSSIAN FLEET IS READY

Citizens Leaving Petrograd in Face of German Arms—No Great Danger Felt by Russians.

PETROGRAD, Oct. 15.—German forces which landed on the Russian island of Oesel, at the head of the Gulf of Riga, on Friday, occupied Arensburg, the capital of the island, on Saturday, it was announced today by the Russian war office.

The northern group of German warships, the statement adds, dispatched a torpedo boat squadron between the islands of Oesel and Dago which pressed back the Russian patrols. Russian naval forces reinforced the patrol and accepted battle, whereupon the German ships retired.

Fighting for Oesel island, the war office announced, continued all day yesterday. A third group of German warships, consisting of cruisers and torpedo boats, approached the southwest coast of Oesel island and bombarded unimportant parts of the coast. German submarines were observed at various times and places in the Baltic.

"Reports that the fleet is not ready to meet the enemy are untrue," said M. Ivanoff. "The fleet is full of fighting ardor and is ready to repel the enemy. Stories of evil influence exerted by the sailors' committees are greatly exaggerated. The near future will show how honorably the fleet will fulfill its duty in the country."

The landing of the Germans has increased the exodus from Petrograd, which has been noticeable since the fall of Riga. Since Saturday the ticket offices have been besieged, many persons offering large premiums for tickets. The situation is aggravated by rumors which were branded officially as unfounded, that passenger traffic will be stopped shortly, in view of the expected evacuation of the government institutions. It is stated in government circles that no extensive evacuation is looked for, as no immediate danger threatens the capital. The new front is still 300 miles distant, it is pointed out, and the roads are impassable. It is not believed a landing in Finland will be attempted owing to the scarcity of supplies there, and to the fact that provisioning would be rendered difficult with winter approaching, by the freezing of the sea.

J. F. LOVELACE IS NEW MAYOR OF ESTACADA

ESTACADA, Or., Oct. 11.—At a meeting of the Estacada City council last night J. F. Lovelace, a retired merchant and a member of the city council for the past two years, was appointed mayor to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of I. D. Wright, who has been mayor of the city for the past two years.

Mr. Wright, who has been a director and cashier of the Estacada State Bank, is leaving the latter part of this month for Denio, Or.

John D. Peterson, of Estacada, was appointed councilman in Mr. Lovelace's place and John Page was appointed city marshal, taking the place of I. M. Park, resigned.

S. B. Wooster, another two-year member of the council will move to Garfield this week.

PREHISTORIC WEAPONS.

They Were Probably Made of Iron Obtained From Meteorites.

In the old world the art of smelting ores was discovered about 1200 B. C. It has sometimes been suggested that iron tools and weapons may have been made at an earlier period from meteorites, and recently a considerable amount of evidence in behalf of this hypothesis has been presented by C. F. Zimmer.

He has compiled a list of the known iron-containing meteorites, nearly all accumulated within the past century, and he shows from these alone about 250 tons of iron might be obtained. Of this amount more than 99 per cent is malleable, consisting of a nickel-iron alloy. He also shows by means of a series of illustrations how easy it is to detach from the meteorite fragments of iron suitable for use as tools or implements when mounted in handles.

This it seems fairly probable that a widespread use may have been made of meteoritic iron in prehistoric times. At the time of the Spanish conquest of Mexico the Aztecs had iron knives and daggers, which, they declared, had been obtained from the sky. Moreover, the use of meteoritic iron by Eskimos and American Indians is a matter of recent history.—Scientific American.

A Cask's Capacity.

Should you wish to get the capacity of a cask you can do so in the following manner: Take the measurements from the bung hole to the bottom of each end of the cask in inches. Average the two measurements. Multiply this figure by itself twice, then multiply the product by .00236, and the remainder is the number of gallons. Example: 31 inches, 29 inches (average 30 inches); 30x30x30=27,000, which multiplied by .00236=63.782. The contents, therefore, are sixty-one gallons and a fraction.
