Four men, all members of the crowd of 32 who came down from Seattle Monday to work in the paper mills and who attempted to leave the city Wednesday, were arrested shortly before the departure of the 9:38 train for the north by Night Officers F. C. Burk and Ed Surfus. They are suspected of being enemy allens.

Two of the men, Otto Rose, and the other who answers to the high sounding name of Colonel Edw. deReymonte. M. D., were locked up in the city jail and the others were taken to the county jail.

Rose admits he is a German and that he is not naturalized. DeReymonte affirms he is a British subject and demanded that he be permitted to communicate with the British counsel, but he is unable to speak English and his papers indicate he is a Russian. His visiting card dignifies him with the title of "sepor consulting physician" at Carnegie university, Wilmington, Del. His personal belongings include a sword and a valuable aneroid barometer.

De Reymonte excited the antagonism of his fellows at the station Wednesday night and appealed to the police for protection. He made a vigorand walked the floor of his cell most of the night.






