OFFICERS TAKE THREE IN CUSTODY LAST FRIDAY

SHANDY COMES BACK; DEFENDS MILL WORKERS

OREGON CITY, Dec. 18.—(Editor of the Enterprise)—I see in your paper of December 11th my worthy friend T. J. Phillips, comes back at me with a very flimsy argument, in fact, hardly worth paying any attention to, but as I have a few more truths to present, will honor him with a reply.

My worst objection to his article is his lack of proper respect and devotion to Christ. The idea of classing the Savior of men, on the equal with such hoodlums as the agitators of this union, Christ an agitator? May I ask you to read Eph. 2:14, where Christ is spoken of as "being our peace." Also Luke 24:36 Christ says "Peace be unto you." Then read Isa. 9:6, where the prophet calls Him "counselor, everlasting father, prince of peace." I fail to find in the book of books where He is spoken of as an agitator. If you can, please send me the reference. You say, "Christ was an agitator and men have been doing the same ever since." Now, see here, Christ came to save souls of men, gave His life for the sins of the world, suffered on the cross. It was the people who agitated, and crucified Him. Luke 23:65—"and many other things blasphemously spake they against him." And let me add right here, men are following those people in blasphemy against him. If you don't believe it just stand around a bunch of picket men on some corner.

When a man who is working at the mills now, gets hurt by union men say, "It is good enough for him, he got his deserts." I have heard many of you say it myself, and yet the man is a law abiding man, only doing his duty and supporting his family. Others threaten to kill or hang those who are working if they can only get hold of them. Would that make conditions better than they were when men were all working and earning on honest living? Then men and women were friends, now they are enemies. There is no Christ love abroad. Everything seems almost like mob law. Even my friend Mr. Phillips thinks hanging or shooting too good for me—"Thank you."

Just give these unionists rope enough, and they, like Judas, will hang themselves. Yes, Esau sold his birthright and how many countless others are doing the same. If right of birth, all men have an equal right to be pure, clean minded men, serving God who gave his only son for their eternal salvation. But instead of our churches being crowded on Sunday to hear his message, they sell that birthright for a mess of pottage at the labor temple, where they gather in crowds four times as large as can be found in any of the churches in Oregon City.

Any one who leads men and women away from God, His ways and His teachings, is a traitor to himself and his God, and to all that is good. I still say a union agitator is a traitor to his country. Why? Because in these hours of anguish and war, we should be a united body of citizens, ready to work, to go or to give to the call of our country, so as to gain universal peace for the world. Then we should work for peace at home, not be stirring up strife and discord in our dear little home city, and thereby require the appointing of special police.

Yes, a striker is a traitor to his family, traitor to the marriage vows he took at God's altar. Is a man protecting his wife and children when he has them out at 6 o'clock mornings and evenings, in the cold and rain standing picket duty on the street corner, hurling hisses, and abusive remarks at honest men as they go to work. (Really an honest working man seems to be quite a curiosity these days, don't you know.)

So you did not discover your brain was made to think with for 22 years. Are you not a little slow? Better use it easy until you get used to it as you might have brain fever. Yes, there are a lot of men, it is true, who expect the boss to think for them, and if the boss did not think for them, and just let the poor fellow do what he really could do, he would not be able to hold a job at all and would become a public charge. Yes, hasten the day when all working men will begin to think for themselves, and give value received to their employer for every dollar wages they draw. Then there will not be the need of so many bosses. Then the men will not be trying to slip one over on the boss, and sleep while they are on duty.

As to putting on my thinking cap. My friends, it is pretty well worn already, doing the thinking for just such fellows as you. You ask why one man can ride in his automobile and eat ham and eggs, when the employes of the same mill have to walk and lucky if they get butter for their bread. I see I yet must think for you. You see one man has used his brain to better advantage and become more efficient. There are men in the employ of the mills of this city who have worked there for 28 years or more, who own their own homes, have educated their children, are in comfortable circumstances. Some of them owning their automobiles, who have earned every dollar of it working at these local mills. Others work a short time and are gone, never sticking to anything long enough to save a dollar. Some who are out on this strike, have also worked for years, and the foremen have repeatedly been asked to ascertain where the checks went to, as they were never cashed at any of the banks, but those were the days when you could cash a check over the bar of any saloon. Now brother, why can some drive automobiles and eat ham and eggs, while

some hardly have butter for their bread. Just keep on thinking with your brain. You'll get it. Yes, the world owes every man a living, providing he works for the money to pay for it. Now what do you owe the world? Even the high school girls can see through the gauze of the union web. I heard one remark that other day. "What do they want any way? First they wanted a 25 cent raise, now they want an automobile with ham and eggs thrown in." You bet that girl is a thinker, and she isn't 22 years old either. She will be efficient some day.

Mr. Phillips your reply kept reminding me of the Missouri mule and the Irishman. But Workers, workers get to work. And earn your honest dollar. What do we care, if they stand around. And hoot, and hiss and holler. H. A. SHANDY.
