

SENATE DEBATES ON CONTROL OF PRINT PAPER RESOLUTION

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—Debate on the resolution authorizing the president to have the federal trade commission take control of the print paper industry continued throughout today in the senate.

Attacks on the resolution were made during the day by Senators Hardwick, Smoot, Sherman and King. Senator Smoot characterized it as "a most vicious measure," and declared that under its provisions the president would be able to withhold print paper from any newspaper or magazine he desired.

The measure was vigorously defended by Senator Owen, who said such a step was necessary to break the power held by the alleged paper monopoly over the press. He charged that the paper makers now can dictate to the press a free country by withholding supplies.

New Khedive of Egypt



Ahmed Fouad Pacha, the new khedive of Egypt, succeeded his brother, the late Khedive Houssein Kemil. The new khedive is regarded as a strong man and his rule is expected to be successful. Ahmed Fouad Pacha, despite his prominent position, has managed to keep out of the limelight in affairs of his country, and little is known of his political feelings.

FOOD SITUATION WITH ALLIES IS GRAVE PROBLEM

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7. The food situation in the allied countries of Europe is graver than it has been at any time since the beginning of the war and is giving American government officials deep concern. Official reports picture extreme food shortages in England, France and Italy.

The fact that conditions in Germany and Austria are far worse offers the only grounds for optimism in viewing the situation.

In England and France the situation is described as critical in a cablegram to the food administration today from Lord Rhondda, the British food controller, which concluded with these words:

"I view the situation with grave anxiety."

In Italy conditions are not as good perhaps as in either England or France. Compulsory rationing will be started in England immediately with meats the first commodity to be put under control. Distribution of butter and margarine will be taken in hand next and other foods will be added as they become scarcer. All of the principal foodstuffs will be rationed by April.

MARKET REPORT

Market operations at the North Portland Yards have carried a comparatively small volume of business for the week's opening markets, but general quality of the offerings is improved over the previous week in most departments. The Monday cattle shipment was medium, with several loads of high-class steers. The hog shipment was rather heavy, with two or three loads of extra well finished hogs, and the receipts in the sheep houses were very light and mostly ordinary offerings. High-water conditions are offering a serious handicap to livestock movements and adding considerably to the grief of the railroad operators and to the congestion of freight movements in general.

While Monday's market in the cattle section showed signs of sluggishness and a tendency towards lower prices early in the morning, this condition was soon lifted and the day developed an active market at firm prices, which continue to prevail up to the present writing. Several loads of steers crossed the scales at \$10.50 and the choice offerings in the cow department changed hands at \$7.75 and market hiders changed hands at \$5.50. Bulls continue strong at 4 1/2 to 7c. A splendid demand was shown for top quality staff and proper premiums were offered to encourage better "finishing."

The hog alleys also showed good demand for finished offerings and paid a spread sufficient to offer encouragement to the farmer for topping his produce before bringing to the market. The best load of hogs, being well finished heavy, went over the scales at \$15.85 and several loads of good heavy brought \$15.65, while the ordinary prices extended from \$15.40 to \$15.60. It pays to "finish."

The sheep department developed a light demand, just about balanced with the supply, which means a small volume of business in that department, the greater part of which continues to be with breeding ewes and feeder lambs.

During the past few days the market prices have advanced on meats. Spring chickens have also taken a raise from 15 cents to 20 cents, and old roosters from 8 to 10 cents to 10 and 12 cents. Veal has gone from 14 to 16 cents to 16 and 17 cents. Hogs have gone one-half cent more.

With the scarcity of sugar in the country at the present time the dealers are not selling this in large lots. The retail price is 13 pounds for \$1.00.

With the present weather condition there is prospect of the price of eggs

to decline, and are today retailing at 43 and 45 cents.

The price of butter remains about the same, with the retail price of country product from 90 to 95 cents, and creamery \$1.15 and \$1.20.

There are plenty of fresh vegetables being supplied by the local gardeners and the stores of the city. Spinach, cabbage, parsnips, onions, lettuce, oyster plant, winter radishes are among the vegetables that the housewives are finding in fresh lots.

California fruits are in the market, with the oranges and grapefruit plentiful, but most oranges are ranging from 40 cents to 50 cents per dozen. The cheaper priced oranges are scarce.
