You have no idea of how quickly we grab that paper from home and read every bit of it. We learn there of little happenings that our people might forget to write of and can keep in touch with what the people back in "God's Country" are doing. I was lucky enough to run across Captain "Bill" Logus the other day and when I told him that you were sending the "Enterprise" to those of us in the Eighteenth he was tickled to death and wanted me to send him some of the old copies right away. Oh, we certainly do appreciate what you are doing all right and we won't forget it in a hurry either. Well, Mr. Petty, we are doing a big job of engineering work over here the like of which I don't suppose any of us will ever see again. We are all mighty anxious though to see this whole Hellish war end and get back to home. It is hard to tell when the war will end but the general opinion over here seems to be that we will have them where we want them some time this year. I hope that turns out to be the case. I suppose you go to the Elks' club quite often and sit in a game o' foal. There are a large number of Elks in this regiment and we have often talked of forming a sort of club, but every one is so busy that it seems we never get around to it. They have Ford automobiles even in France but I haven't seen any with "James Petty" painted across the stern. It would look pretty good to see that machine coming tearing down the main drag. We have a large number of machines in our regiment, but mostly big trucks. About fifteen Pierce Arrows the same number of Packards and some French machines beside several Ford ambulances. Well Mr. Petty, I must quit as it is getting quite late. But again I want to thank you for sending us the paper, and say, "More Power to You." Yours sincerely, SERGT. H. A. PUBLIC SERVICE HEARINGS TO BE HELD HERE SOON

SALEM, Or., Feb. 12.—(Special)—The Public Service commission has set two hearings for Oregon City to be held within the next two months. One of these will be on March 22 to take testimony on a new application for a logging and booming franchise filed by the Milk Creek Logging & Boom company. The other hearing will be on February 28, to take up the matter of two crossings in Clackamas county. The Milk Creek Logging & Booming company had one application for a franchise denied, owing to the failure to follow the law in preparing the application. The new application, which has been filed by Senator Conrad Olson of Portland as attorney for the company asks for a franchise on Milk creek from the confluence of Canyon creek to the sluice way at the C. T. Howard Flour mill and also on the tributaries of the stream as well as on the main channel of Cedar creek to its confluence with Milk creek or Buckner creek and to the confluence with Milk creek on Woodcock creek. Among other improvements contemplated are the completion of a railway spur on the Willamette Valley Southern near Mullino; improvement of two dams on Buckner creek; construction of sluiceways on the D. T. Trullinger dam at the mouth of Cedar creek; a dam for a reservoir at Hult Brothers mill at Colton, and a dam at the confluence of Canyon and Milk creeks. A number of other minor improvements and works are contemplated on the stream if the commission grants the application for a franchise.

U. S. NOT TO TURN BACK IN WAR FOR DEMOCRACY

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11—Holding in his hand an olive branch for Austria but emphatically reiterating that the United States "will not turn back but will put its whole strength into the war of emancipation from the threat and attempted mastery of selfish groups of autocratic rulers," President Wilson today answered in plain terse words, the latest peace terms of Austria and Germany as uttered by Count Czernin and Count Hertling. To a hastily summoned joint session of congress the president once more specifically repudiated all suggestions of a "made-in-Germany peace." Count von Hertling, he declared, would return to the methods of the "congress of Vienna," and secure peace by individual barter and concession. To that the United States will never consent, the president insisted. It is possible that Count von Hertling does not see that the peace of the world is at stake; the president asked. He demanded why the reichstag resolutions of July 19, which declared for peace without annexations or indemnities, had been ignored by the German chancellor. And again he declared that nothing which is settled by military force is settled at all, but would have to be reopened. In direct contrast to his sharp criticism of the German attitude was the president's reference to the Austrian position enunciated by Count Czernin. The Austrian reply, said the president, is uttered in a very friendly tone. Making it plain that he had received a copy of the Austrian statement's address in advance and assuring the congress that he was "quite content to be one of his (Czernin's) public auditors," the president explained that "Count Czernin seems to see the fundamental elements of peace with clear eyes and does not seek to obscure them."

"Seeing and conceding as he does" declared the president, "the essential principles involved and the necessity of candidly applying them, he naturally feels that Austria can respond to the purpose of peace as expressed by the United States with less embarrassment. The president again emphasized that the United States has no desire to interfere in the internal affairs of Europe. This country has no hard fast aims, he said, but is ready to be shown that the settlements she has suggested are not the best or the most enduring. "She (the United States) cannot see her way to peace until the causes of this war are removed, its renewal rendered as nearly as may be impossible," he declared.

DRAFT EVADERS SLAY OFFICERS NEAR KLONDYKE

GLOBE, Ariz., Feb. 11.—Sheriff McBride and Deputy Sheriffs Martin Kempton and Cain Wootan, of Graham County, are dead, an aged man named Powers, is probably fatally wounded, and Thomas and John Powers, his sons, and Thomas Sisson, are fugitives as a result of a fight near Klondyke, 30 miles southeast of here, early Sunday, when the officers sought to arrest Powers' sons as alleged draft evaders. Deputy United States Marshal Frank Haynes, of Globe, escaped with slight injury. According to Haynes' account, he planned to arrest the young Powers on the draft evasion charge, the Graham county officers volunteering to accompany him from Safford, Ariz.

Measles—We are informed that the measles are quite prevalent now at Canemah.

Austrian Vagabonds—The Austrian vagabonds get homes for the winter by cursing loudly against the emperor or in public. The police everywhere vigilant, at once hear, and send the rascals to warm quarters for six months.

Paid Up—The state taxes of Clackamas county amounting to \$10,535.61, were paid over to the state treasurer at Salem on Monday last, by J. E. Hurford, county treasurer.

On motion Major Rineason, D. P. Thompson and Arthur Warner were elected as a committee to secure the services of a brass band and speakers to address the club. W. C. Johnson, James Winston, D. M. McKenney, H. Warren, W. J. Caldwell, D. C. Ireland, J. M. Frazer, Walter Fish and D. P. Thompson, were constituted a committee on resolutions and platform.

On motion it was ordered that a copy of the minutes be sent the Oregonian and Enterprise.

CLACKAMAS LAND INVOLVED IN CASE BEFORE HIGH COURT

SALEM, Or., Feb. 11.—(Special)—Grant B. Dimick of Oregon City appeared before the supreme court yesterday to argue the case of Emilie Dieckman versus Gust Jaeger, defendant and appellant, brought up from Clackamas county on appeal from Judge Campbell's decision.

The case involves 160 acres of land in Clackamas county. It is alleged that Henry Karl Dieckman made a deed of the property to Emilie Dieckman and placed the deed with a bank at Wilsonville, along with a note providing that in event of his death the deed was to be turned over to Emilie Dieckman. Before his death, however, Dieckman transferred a part of the property to other parties. The lower court held that when the deed was placed in the hands of the bankers at Wilsonville that Dieckman lost control of it, while it is the contention of Mr. Dimick, attorney for Jaeger, that the deed delivered to the bankers could have been withdrawn by Dieckman at any time during his life, and that therefore the deed was never delivered and conveyed nothing.

ELK HOME GUARD OBTAINS MONEY IN COOS COUNTY

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Feb. 11.—The county court in its February session made several appropriations, one of which comes from a war fund of \$10,000.

This gift was for uniforming the Elks' home guard, which the court was assured was to be a permanent organization. The company is allowed \$12 per uniform for 60 men. Other home guard units, of which there are four in the county, were promised the same consideration when they convince the court their companies are to be maintained during the war period.
