LOCAL BANKS HIGH IN NEW STATE LIST

SALEM, Or., April 12.—(Special)—Oregon City banks which stood in thirteenth place in the matter of deposits on November 20, 1917, had jumped to eleventh place on March 4, according to a statement just completed by Superintendent of Banks Bennett, which shows the towns of the state having deposits of \$1,000,000 or over.

The deposits in Oregon City banks have dropped off somewhat, regardless of the climb from thirteenth place to eleventh, the deposits in the three banks there on November 20, last year, being \$2,046,484.88, and on March 4, this year, were \$2,003,793.13. While deposits in Oregon City banks dropped off, the slump is natural for this time of year, the banking department explains, and the fact the Oregon City banks jumped in proportion are holding up better than general throughout the state.

HIGHEST HONOR IS SECURED BY OREGON

Foremost of the states in the Union, population and material resources considered, in voluntary enlistments for the war and for soldiers' relief work, Oregon again is first in going over the top with subscriptions to the Third Liberty Loan. Measuring total subscriptions with the minimum quota, this state has won the distinctive right to waive the honor flag.

Wilcox. Mr. Ganong accepted the appointment.

SAWMILL OPERATOR VICTIM OF BULLET IN BAKER DISTRICT

BAKER, Or., April 15.—William Roseberry, a sawmill operator who resides at Haines, died at St. Elizabeth hospital here Sunday afternoon as the result of a bullet wound inflicted last night by his son-in-law, Charles Spearman. Spearman, who was taken into custody last night by City Marshal Randall, at Haines, was brought to Baker this morning by Sheriff Anderson and placed in the county jail.

WYNDEMERE, N. D., April 15.—Mrs. E. L. Seaton, and her three children were burned to death at their farm home near here Friday night. An explosion in a gasoline tank is believed to have caused the fire.

400 PRISONERS IN NEW MEXICO PUNISH BIRKNER

SANTA FE, N. M., April 17.—Four hundred convicts in the State Penitentiary this afternoon tarred and feathered and led around with a rope about his neck Major John M. Birkner, of Camp Cody, Deming, N. M., who is held in the Penitentiary as a Federal prisoner in default of \$5000 bail. He is charged with violation of the espionage act.

Major Birkner was allowed out in Nuremberg, Germany, but who had been in the American military forces for more than 30 years, was arrested last Friday at Camp Cody, where he was an officer in the 17th Field Artillery. His home is in Lincoln, Neb.

Major Birkner was allowed out in the prison yard for exercise with the 400 convicts. The warden knew nothing of what was going on until he heard loud cheering. He rushed out into the yard and found Birkner stripped and covered with tar and feathers. The prisoners with loud hoots were leading him about the yard with a rope around his neck. Assistant Superintendent Dugan rescued the Major. The prisoners, evidently in accordance with the rathers from their pillows, but where the tar came from is a mystery.

CENSUS ESTIMATED COST \$20,000,000 EXPLAINS DIRECTOR

WASHINGTON, April 17.—Census Director Rogers estimates that the total cost of the 1920 census, including the annual and other inquiries occurring during the decennial census period, if done in accordance with plans the census bureau has formulated, will not exceed \$20,000,000. The estimated cost of taking the population census alone is \$18,400,000.

LATE TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

SALEM, Or., April 17.—Several paroled men from the state penitentiary will be available for employment by farmers in a few days, State Parole Officer Keller said yesterday. The men are experienced farmers. A large number of paroled men are employed in other industries, and because of the present shortage of farm labor it will be the policy of the state prison management to place as many men as possible on the farms.

BEND, Or., April 17.—Vaccination of the cattle of Deschutes county for blackleg began today under the supervision of County Agricultural Ward. This action is taken as a precaution. The government furnishes the vaccine free of charge to all who desire to take advantage of the remedy, and it is announced that a large number of the stockmen in the county will have their stock treated.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 17.—D. J. Fleming, of San Francisco, a traveling salesman, was stricken as he was leaving a hall where he had attended a boxing exhibition tonight and died soon after at the city hospital. He was 60 years old and was employed by the Bowers Rubber works, San Francisco.

TACOMA, Wash., April 17.—C. M. Riddell was yesterday elected mayor of Tacoma over A. V. Favcett. Incumbent, by a majority of about 409. The result was in doubt until the last ten precincts reported, Favcett taking the lead at the start and holding it until over half the precincts had been heard from. The new mayor is chairman of the county council of defense and an attorney.

ROSEBURG, Or., April 17.—Roseburg now has two companies of militia, with Mayor F. W. Haynes in command. The captains are T. A. Rafferty, deputy sheriff, and Percy Webb, a Spanish war veteran. Captain Rafferty has appointed R. L. Gile, first lieutenant, and Guy Gordon, second lieutenant, and Captain Webb has named Roy Agee first lieutenant and H. C. Darby, an O. A. C. graduate, second lieutenant. These men will receive commissions from the governor. A hospital corps is being organized.

MEMORIAL NEAR COMPLETION

SALEM, Or., April 15.—The pioneer memorial building at Champego, for which an appropriation was made by the 1917 legislature, will be completed this week, ahead of schedule time, according to George M. Post, the architect. A final inspection of the building was made Saturday by Mr. Post, Judge P. H. D'Arcy, of Salem, and George H. Himes, of Portland. The building will be dedicated at the annual celebration, May 3.

Pasco Patriots Make Mayor Buy Liberty Bonds

PASCO, Wash., April 15.—Pasco patriots, acting as a vigilance committee, have started a campaign to curb dissoluty here and to see that every person subscribes to the Third Liberty Loan.

The campaign started Friday night when a crowd of men, incensed because G. Willison, Mayor of Pasco and manager of the local branch of the Tum-Log Lumber company, had not subscribed to the liberty loan, routed him out of bed late at night and induced him to buy a \$100 bond.
