

MARKET REPORT

NORTH PORTLAND, Or., July 18.—Cattle receipts Tuesday 150 head. The quality generally running strong to fair to medium and plain, and in consequence prices have declined 25 to 35 cents. Quotations are as follows:

Prime steers, 11.75-12.25; good to choice steers, 10.75-11.75; medium to good steers, 9.50-10.75; fair to medium steers, 8.50-9.50; common to fair steers, 5.50-8.50; choice cows and heifers, 8.00-8.50; medium to good cows and heifers, 6.00-7.50; fair to medium cows and heifers, 5.00-6.00; canners, 3.00-5.00; bulls, 5.50-7.50; calves, 8.50-11.50; stockers and feeders, 6.00-8.00.

Hogs

The receipt of hogs Tuesday was 150 head. The market for the week opened slow but strengthened, developing a new top of 17.75 for prime mixed. All classes are strong at quotations:

Prime mixed, 17.65-17.85; medium mixed, 17.50-17.65; rough heavies, 16.65-16.85; pigs, 15.75-16.25; bulk, 17.50-17.65.

Sheep

The receipt of sheep Tuesday was nominal, all classes of mutton are in good demand at quotations as follows: East of Mt. Lamba, 13.50-14.00; valley lambs, 13.00-13.50; yearlings, 9.00-10.00; wethers, 8.00-9.00; ewes, 6.00-8.00.

Although the continued dry weather has been a detriment to gardening throughout Clackamas county, the local farmers and Chinese gardeners are supplying the markets with the necessary vegetables, where the demand calls. Many are complaining of the aphid ruining their crops, especially the peas have suffered from the effects of the same. Many gardeners, in order to save other crops from the pest, were forced to raise their pea vines. The crop is limited and those having their vines free from the aphids are considering themselves lucky. Good prices were paid for the same.

The first local cucumbers of the season have been brought in during the week, and are bringing a retail price of five cents each.

The last of the strawberries are now in the market. Only those arriving now are the Everbearing, that are of delicious flavor, and retailing at two boxes for 25 cents.

Loganberries, as well as raspberries are to be found, although the vines have suffered from the continued warm weather. The raspberries are retailing at from \$2.25 to \$2.50 per crate, while the Logan berries are selling at \$1.75.

Currents are in the market and are finding a good demand.

Blackberries are among the new fruits arriving during the past few days, selling at 10 cents per box. The price of these will be much cheaper.

Local Red Astrachan apples are appearing for cooking purposes, and within a few weeks there will be a large supply in the markets. From the present indications the apple crop, as well as the plum, pear and peach crop will be bumper ones. The peaches are scarce, although there are a few early varieties now arriving. The retail price of these is 25 cents per dozen. A large number of these arriving at the local stores are from the Judge Thomas Ryan fruit farm near Gladstone.

New potatoes are selling at 3 cents per pound wholesale, or 5 cents retail, or \$2.00 per 100. Old potatoes are ranging from \$1.00 to \$1.25 per 100 pounds.

The price of butter and eggs remains the same as last week.

CAN YOUR FRUIT WITHOUT SUGAR Fruits Will Keep in Water and May Be Used Later On

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 13.—"Keep canning, sugar or no sugar," say specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture. If you can't get enough sugar for home canning put up your fruit without it. The products will keep perfectly until a time when more sugar is available or until a sugar substitute program has been worked out. Fruits put up in this way are excellent for pie-filling and salads and may be used in desserts, puddings, ices and punches.

In canning fruit without sugar, can the product the day it is picked. Cut, stem, seed, and clean fruit by placing in strainer and pouring cold water over it. Pack the product carefully in hot glass jars or tin cans until full. Use a tablespoon, wooden ladle, or table knife for packing purposes. Pour boiling hot water over the product in the hot jar. Place rubbers and caps in position, not tight. If using tin cans, seal completely. Place in the sterilizer vat or canner, and sterilize for the length of time given below according to the particular type of outfit used:

Minutes
Hot-water bath, homemade or commercial.....30
Water seal, 214 degrees.....20
5 pounds steam pressure.....12

10 pounds steam pressure.....10
After sterilizing remove the filled containers. Seal jars; invert to cool and test the joints. Wrap in paper to prevent bleaching and store in a dry, cool place. If tin cans are used it will be found advantageous to plunge them into cold water immediately after sterilization to cool them quickly.

If cabbage heads are cut off instead of pulled, new leaves will come out and furnish good green food for poultry.

She has an abundance of untilled farm land, inexhaustible mines, rich forests and ample water supply. Our inventive genius is never dry. And we shall have at the close of the war a merchant marine such as America or any other nation has never before known.
